Dear Mr. Caldwell:

My husband and I are totally opposed to the proposed hog operation that Trenton Farms RE, LLC plans to build in Grundy County at Section 19, Range 60-N, Township 24-W. We believe that water quality will be negatively affected since Hickory Creek is located 1400 feet from the facility and spillage will drain in that direction. Also, the proposed site for hog waste to be applied lies in a flood plain of the Hickory Creek/Thompson River. This area has been flooded many times in the last ten years. Last year, 2014, the area flooded in late spring and again in the fall. Proof of contracts for the spreading of the hog waste other than a flood plain appears necessary.

The recent Hickory Creek Watershed Project was a program funded in part by the Federal Government to improve and protect this valuable natural resource. An endangered fish, the Topeka Shiner, has been known to live in this stream. Part of the purpose of the Hickory Creek Watershed Project was to help this critter and other flora and fauna have their place among us.

People in this watershed have been doing their part building terraces, planting trees, building ponds, sowing down eroding fields, and allowing setbacks for trees and wildlife. Much of this land is century farms having been owned by families for over 100 years. Drainage from hog waste will destroy these efforts. I might add, the Bald Eagle has nests near the Thompson River and uses the waterway for catching fish. Nitrates in the water kill fish.

We urge you to carefully consider all the negative implications of such an operation. We also request a public hearing on this proposal. Please do all you can to stop this hog operation.

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

Dear Mr. Caldwell:

Plans are being made to place a 7,000 hog operation on Highway Route W, South East of Hickory, MO in Grundy County. The site is five miles from Hickory Creek and Persons living in the area are very concerned about the effect of the air quality and water quality surrounding this operation.

The owners plan to spread twenty-nine million pounds of hog manure on bottom lands right next to the Thompson River each year. This bottom ground has flooding and water can stand on the ground many days then will washes into the Thompson River and then flows south affecting every city on the river's path.

The impact on Highway W roads will be tremendous. There are two bridges on Highway W. that have very serious structural problems. If these bridges deteriorate as they will the bridges they will need to be closed. The traffic on Highway W is already heavy and with loaded hog trucks running over them they will continue to deteriorate at a faster rate. Persons living in the area will have to use county roads which will cost the county additional monies to maintain the roads.

The health of area residents will be put into jeopardy by unclean air and water. Four persons living in my house family is very important to me. Dear Mr. Caldwell:

I would like to request a public hearing to address our concerns with the proposed hog facility to be located on Route W southwest of Trenton, MO. All surface water, accumulated from rainfall surrounding this proposed CAFO, drains southward to Hickory Creek. This creek lies only 1300 feet from the proposed CAFO and is a tributary of the Thompson River, lying 1.7 miles downstream. In addition to this, all the animal waste produced by this CAFO is to be spread on Hickory Creek and Thompson River bottom land all lying in a flood plain. There is no way to keep this hog effluent from eventually reaching these natural drainage systems. Also it is stated in the Missouri Department of Natural Resources Guide to Animal Feeding Operations that areas with flood frequencies greater than once in ten years should not be the only land available for land application of animal waste. The only land in the proposed permit stated for effluent application is land that has flooded four (4) of the last five (5) years, superseding the Department of Natural Resources standards.

The above items alone, not mentioning ground water that lies eighteen feet from the surface of these flood plains, should be reason enough for a public hearing. Knowing that surface and ground water are the main considerations when denying a CAFO permit, I look forward to a public hearing with your department.

Dear Mr. Caldwell,

I am outraged and object to approval for the construction and operation of the proposed large-scale hog confinement planned for Grundy County located in the Southwest Quarter of Section 19, Township 60-N Range 24-W. The proposed factory farm is near to the farm and forest that I own and love (445 SW 54 Trenton). I share my property with a variety of wild species (e.g. Heron, eagles, birds, fish, snakes, deer, rabbits, fox etc.). It has been my lifelong dream to own and enjoy such a beautiful place.


The proposed facility will disrupt my rights to the enjoyment of my property by forcing the smell of pig urine and feces (reminiscent of rotten eggs and ammonia) on my property. The polluted air from these facilities contain methane, carbon dioxide, ammonia and hydrogen sulfide. These are all known pollutants with harmful properties. I absolutely do not want to breathe polluted air that may impact my health or have that smell on my property. I am also concerned that it will significantly impact the value of my property. I have serious concerns regarding the how this facility will impact my personal health as well as the health of wildlife and plants in the area.

It is my understanding that both the Clean Water Act and the Endangered Species Act are relevant to this proposal and both need to be thoroughly reviewed by the government. I am very concerned about the impact of pig urine and feces to air and to local waters. The biological effects to the food chain need to be thoroughly reviewed by the government. What is the status of the consultation with U.S. Fish and Wildlife? How will migratory birds or species protected by the Endangered Species Act be impacted by the polluted air, pig urine and feces, effects to surface and ground water from the facility, traffic, construction or operational noise, lighting or the smell? Also what is the impact to plants protected under the Endangered Species Act?

The Missouri Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) *Mission (as posted on it's website) is as follows: "The mission of the Missouri Department of Natural Resources is to protect our air, land and water; preserve our unique natural and historic places; and provide recreational and learning opportunities for everyone"*. I have been told that the MDNR has never turned down an application for a Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation (CAFO). Is this true? Does MDNR monitor the air, land as well as surface and groundwater in areas that surround the CAFO's they have approved?

I respectfully request that MDNR hold a public hearing to address community concerns and ultimately reject this proposed large-scale hog confinement facility.

Dear Mr. Caldwell:

I am writing in opposition to the Don Davis proposal to construct a hog confinement operation southwest of Trenton, MO near Hickory. I adamantly believe the operation will pollute the Thompson River watershed and its tributary Hickory Creek as the hog effluent will be spread on ground located in the flood plain and on land that has flooded many times in the last 10 years.

As background, my husband Ken and I have been farmers and residents of Grundy County, MO since 1979, and our farm home is located off WW near Highway 6. I grew up on what is now the Freddie Key Century Farm, which is located just over a mile north from the proposed hog CAFO. Our family's land has been continuously farmed by my great grandfather, grandfather, father and now brother. My son and his family of two small children live on Highway W within 1.5 miles of the proposed hog CAFO. Along with other family members and many Hickory area residents, we are about to have our way of life changed forever if the proposed hog farm is allowed to be built.


Studies done by the University of Iowa show many human health and environmental problems are caused by mega hog farm operations. The millions of pounds of excrement that will be produced annually by the proposed operation near Hickory will very likely contaminate ground water and streams, which can kill fish, clog streams with algae, feed water born disease organisms, and wreak havoc on the environment.

Specifically, information from the Institute of Science, Technology and Public Policy indicates that CAFOs are causing measurable harm across a broad range of environmental, biological, and economic parameters. Studies have found that factory farms present the following problems:
(http://istpp.org/pdf/istpp_cafo.pdf)

- Significant amounts of toxic animal waste are released into water and air without environmental controls in place, causing pollution to air, soil, and the water supply.
- This pollution, in turn, appears to be a causative factor in the increased illness rates observed among people who live near CAFO facilities.
- The widespread, routine administration of antibiotics to confined hogs increases bacterial drug resistance and thereby endangers public health.
- Land values and quality of life in areas near CAFOs have been shown to decrease markedly and consistently.
- The local economy suffers rather than improves, and small-scale farming declines.

Mr. Caldwell, I ask that the Missouri Department of Natural Resources deny the hog farm proposal by Don Davis. At a minimum, you and others from MDNR should visit the site, hold a public hearing with residents of the Hickory area and Grundy County, and assess the potential risks to the waters of north Missouri including the town of Chillicothe, MO located downstream



I strongly object to the plan by Trenton Farms RE, LLC, 1300 S. Hwy 75, Pipestone MN 56164, to build and operate a sow complex on the SW ¼ of Section 19, Township 60-N, Range 24-W, Grundy County Missouri. This complex would negatively affect the value of my property, which is located Northeast of the proposed complex, due to the odor and increased traffic. The waste could damage the ecosystem and affect the ground water in the local area if spills occur. The proposed area for the complex is known to have periodic flooding which would harmfully affect Hickory Creek and the Thompson River if waste is washed into them.

Factory farms concentrate an unnatural number of animals in one place, which creates an unmanageable amount of waste. For example, a single hog excretes up to 17.5 pounds of manure and urine each day. Put 1,000 hogs together, and that's six million pounds of waste each year. On a factory farm containing 6,000 hogs, over six hundred and eighty five pounds of waste are produced each week, and over 35 million pounds each year. Whereas on a sustainable farm animal waste can be a tool, in factory-farm amounts it becomes a major pollutant.

The creation and disposal of such enormous quantities of waste has a devastating effect on the air, water and soil surrounding factory farms. Unlike human waste, livestock manure is not processed for sanitation. On factory farms it is commonly mixed with water and held in pits (called "lagoons"), and then spread or sprayed on cropland. But the system often suffers from an excess of manure: the lagoons can leak or spill, for instance, or the manure is over-applied to fields, which can cause it to run off into surface waters.

Manure carries with it other substances that are used on industrial farms. These include antibiotics and artificial growth hormones, which contaminate waterways and affect the plants and animals that live in them. Salt, a common component of manure from industrial farms, can damage soil quality and contributes to erosion.

Nutrients and heavy metals present in animal feed are also excreted by livestock, and so end up being applied to cropland. These include zinc, copper, chromium, arsenic, cadmium and even lead. In balanced amounts, some of these elements can be good for soil and promote plant growth. But as factory farms over-apply manure to fields, a significant quantity of nutrients builds up in the soil and can actually reduce the soil's fertility. This damage is difficult to reverse, and ultimately puts fertile cropland out of use.

Factory farms emit harmful gases and particles such as methane and hydrogen sulfide, which can contribute to global warming and harm the health of those living or working nearby. Air pollution results from the overuse of machinery, the mismanagement of manure, and the irresponsible feeding practices that characterize industrial farming.

Chemical fertilizers and pesticides have turned agriculture into a leading source of water pollution in the United States. Runoff from factory farms kills fish, degrades aquatic habitats and threatens drinking water supplies. Additionally, factory farms use tremendous amounts of water, which cuts into our precious supplies of water that are not contaminated.

Grundy County Road W is not designed for heavy traffic. There will be increased traffic of workers, feed trucks, manure trucks, and hog trucks using Rt. W if the complex is built. Grundy County would be responsible for the increased maintenance and upkeep of Rt. W. The project is being operated by an out-of-state entity which means little benefit will come to Grundy County or the State of Missouri.

For these reasons I strongly object to the proposed complex being built in this location.



Correction to previous comment: Rt. W is state maintained, not county.

Addendum to previous comment:

The amount of manure and urine which will be generated by 6,000+ hogs is approximately 35,000,000 pounds per year. Since it cannot be spread during growing season or when the soil is frozen, it will have to be accumulated at the site of origin. This will amount to large amounts of manure being held in the area of the hog farm. The area where the complex is to be built is wetland since the soil is saturated a large part of the year. The area is subject to periodic flooding by Hickory Creek. Hickory Creek is the habitat of the endangered Topeka Shiner Minnow. Heavy rain and/or flooding could produce contamination of the local groundwater and environmental and ecological damage to Hickory Creek, damaging the habitat of the Topeka Shiner Minnow, and to the Thompson River. The Pinnacle Group has not responded to requests for their "plan" for managing the manure or urine, making specific comments impossible. It has been observed that the heavy truck traffic of feed trucks, manure trucks, and cattle trucks near the Princeton Hog Farm has resulted in significant damage to the blacktop roads in the area and the same can be expected in the Trenton Farms locale on Rt. W. The local bridge over Hickory Creek is unsafe for heavy loads and it is expected the state will place load limits on it. The odor, insects, and parasites associated with hog farms have been shown in studies in Iowa to cause health problems, particularly to children and the elderly, for several miles around the areas of hog farms as well as create problems for nearby cattle. The same study in Iowa showed that property values near hog farms were reduced by 40%. Trenton Farms RE, LLC, is a Pipestone, MN, company, so profits will not stay in Missouri.

In summary, the Trenton Farms RE, LLC complex will contaminate the groundwater, harm the environment and ecology, adversely affect the habitat of an endangered species, damage local infrastructure, create health problems for people and livestock, and negatively impact the local economy. Trenton Farms RE, LLC, is a disaster waiting to happen and should not receive a permit to operate.

I am writing in response to the letter of notification to landowners of Grundy County Missouri from Trenton Farms RF, LLC of their proposal to build and operate a sow complex in Grundy County.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this proposal and for your time in consideration of my comments. I am a retired professional engineer, registered in the State of Missouri. I am also a partner in Shelburne Valley Farms LLC where our family has farmed along the banks of Hickory Creek for more than 150 years. While I trust that most of my concerns will be addressed in the permit review process I want to submit them for public record. My comments are as follows:

Calculation of farm category:

The potential to cause water quality impairment can be directly tied to the volume of manure and waste water generated and stored. Basing the farm category on such broad groups as swine >55 pounds or <55 pounds makes it difficult to accurately judge the impact potential. A 6,056 head sow farm will produce significantly more manure than a 6,056 head grow-finish operation. Using data from the American Society of Agricultural Engineering Standard D384.2 MAR2005, Manure Production and Characterization estimates indicate that the proposed sow farm will produce more than 29 million pounds of manure annually while a similar sized grow-finish farm would only produce 22 million pounds of manure annually.

Farm Siting:

Depending on the final location of the swine barns, the separation distance from the barns to the occupied residence to the North will be approximately 1,200 feet or just beyond the required minimum. This coupled with the fact the number and size of animals put it near the upper limit of a Class 1C category facility and the small size of the farm property (4.05 acres) make it unlikely that the farm will be able to meet nuisance odor thresholds. The Purdue University-Odor Setback Model can be used to predict the distances required between a proposed livestock barn and the neighbors to avoid potential odor nuisance complaints. (<https://engineering-purdue.edu/~odor/setback/index.html>). Results from running the Odor Setback Model suggests that without using odor reducing measures at the farm buildings a setback distance of approximately 3,400 feet would be necessary to reduce the risk of odor related nuisance complaints originating from the North and Northeast of the barns. Primarily due to the prevailing wind direction, the Southeast would be the least impacted direction, but still require a minimum setback of at least 1,500 feet.

Land application areas:


According to the State of Missouri, DNR CAFO guide lines areas with flood frequencies greater than once in ten years should not be the only land available for land application. Virtually all of the crop land to the East of the farm and Highway W are known to flood at a frequency significantly more than once every ten years (Soil Survey of Grundy County, Missouri, and my personal knowledge).

Storm water runoff:

The farm site and most of the land in the vicinity of the farm drain to Hickory Creek. Storm water runoff from the barn site will be conveyed directly to Hickory Creek via road ditches or field ditches. Any runoff from manure application fields will drain to either Hickory Creek or directly to the Thompson River.

Hickory Creek is a unique small Prairie Stream. It is one of the few streams in Grundy County that has not been channelized and previous sampling studies confirmed it to be habitat for the federally and state listed endangered small minnow called the Topeka Shiner.

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

Dear DNR and to whom it concerns,

We are writing in regards to the recent request to build a hog confinement near our location of residence. I have lived in the hickory area for over 12 years and have personally farmed and managed the ground that is to be used to inject the hog waste on for the 12 years prior to Don Davis purchasing it. I personally know the ground lays in the flood plane all but a very few acres. The ground usually floods 3 times a year and was under water completely except for about 80 acres when Mr. Davis got a contract signed to purchase the farm. I also have dated pictures with times on file of the floods from several years and would also like to add that the Hwy W gets closed temporarily 2 to 3 times a year because water gets so high. The farm where the injection is to take place is also commonly known as zook and wabash soil mainly with some sandy soil near the river. There is a lot of ponding with water standing year round as the soil on the farm does not soak up. I would invite you to take a look at the crop insurance coverage available on the farm as it will all be high risk except for very few acres. I say this with experience and operating the farm as I stated for the previous 12 years for Dan Strong of whom I was a farm manager for.

I would now like to address some things on the request for the permit that I noticed. In the request it was stated a secluded area. This is not true as it is a highway frontage location and has two churches very near by and is a highly traveled road with school buses and a high flow of traffic to and from Poosey Conservation area that is near by. The smell and the traffic from workers will induce a hazard for the churches and health hazards from the odors. Myself personally also raise registered swine within walking distance of where the farm is to be built. This will bring birds and diseases that the birds will spread potentially to my herd as there is not a hog confinement around that does not have a disease problem or sicknesses go through them. There is also three other neighbors within walking distance that raise registered hogs as well. There is also neighbors so close that if you would stand on the proposed site you could holler and not have to be very loud and carry on a conversation with the neighbors to the north as well as the south. It is also stated that a Pipe Stone vet says Davis is a long time farmer and has experience in the hog confinement and farming operations but the truth be known Mr. Davis does not live in the approximate area but over 2 hours away in an adjoining state. Mr. Davis also does not do any of the farming himself as he has it custom farmed and is very seldom around maybe once a year to my knowledge. I would also like to add he works a day job as a CFO for a coop in Red Oak Iowa and not farming at all. I have personally met Mr. Davis and showed him the farm so I know what I am talking about! Mr. Davis also made some promises so to say to the individual selling the farm but told me one thing and the agent another and does not speak the truth and feel he can somewhat not be trusted. I do have emails and documentation to back my claims.

My wife and I currently built a new house near the location and it will not even allow us to enjoy our new home from the odor of the south winds and will create health issues not only for us but adjoining neighbors. The run off of the application as I previously stated how much the ground floods will kill fish and run directly into the Thompson as the ground lays on the river and all drainage from it goes directly to the Thompson River. I would also like to add there is three different endangered species of fish there and one endangered species of birds there as well. I would also like to add at one point the Dept. of Conservation approached me and Mr. Strong to sign up some of the ground into a wetland program as there was so much aquatic life and birds there but were unable to come to terms on it and wonder with that said why anybody would allow waste to be injected on that area. We were working with the local conservation agent Jeff Berti at that time. The farm is also known to some as a historical marker as the late Burleigh Grimes owned the farm at one time and should be preserved not polluted.

I wonder why it stated Mr. Davis wants to better manage his operations why he would build so far away and not near his residence where he could better manage operations and do the farming himself so he has first hand knowledge of whats going on and not hire everything done and work a day job somewhere else and not be hands on but yet claim to be.

I will close in saying there is believed to be an old indian burial ground on the proposed site as there has been

many artifacts found to back that and also asbestoes has been illegally buried from an old structure there and endangered bats living in another old structure there that i assume will be torn down that i have personally seen. This if allowed with do nothing beneficial to the community but to Mr. davis, hurt wildlife, create hazards, down grade property values and pollute the water table, river, streams, and the current Hickory Creek Watershed project.



This letter is written as a resident who is opposed to the confined hog complex that is proposed for the Hickory area that, as the crow flies, is 4.7 miles southwest of Trenton, Mo. Don Davis of Red Oak, Iowa has petitioned to build this facility to house 6,056 sows, 320 nursery pigs, and 960 swine over 55 lbs. I am not opposed to this type of facility in general but there are environmental issues with this particular facility.

I am the former owner of the major portion of the land where this hog manure will be spread. All of this land is located in a river bottom where the water table is approximately eighteen feet below the surface. I know this because we used to drive sand points to get water to spray crops. All of this land is also adjacent to Hickory Creek and the Thompson river. Flooding from Hickory Creek and the Thompson River occurs from time to time. Once it floods, the flood water returns to the river through the old river bed. Fresh raw hog manure with its vile impurities will drain into the Thompson River, a tributary that feeds into the Grand River at Chillicothe, MO, where this water is enjoyed by waterfowl and recreational fishing. In essence, the hog manure is being dumped in the river.

John Rice is a retired USDA Conservation Service engineer. He was born and raised on this same land. He has calculated there will be 29 million pounds of hog manure generated per year by the 6,056 sows planned for this new facility. This does not include the nursery pigs and swine over 55 lbs. This data comes from the American Engineering Standard D384.2 MAR 2005 Manure Production Characterization. This amount of raw sewage in flood water has to be a threat to healthy living for those downstream.

There are many negative issues that will be generated in this community if this hog facility is approved but sadly, none have any bearing on what the developers can do. However, when the pits are dug to contain the manure under the hog buildings, they will be very close to the water table. Any leakage at all will contaminate the local water supply and any wells. If government agencies can't or won't protect us, there is no need for the agency.

My definition of the Department of Natural Resources is an agency formed to protect and regulate the threats to any and all of nature's natural resources to keep them in their pure form. If this department allows raw hog manure to drain into our river and creek, then it has no function. We are in hope that the Department of Natural Resources will control environmental issues that can affect public health. Once the possibilities of health issues like this have been addressed and then the facility is approved anyway, there has to be liability if community sickness develops from this raw hog manure getting in our water supply.

We, as a community, are asking that this potentially hazardous condition be addressed before this project is approved.

We are very concerned that a hog operation of the proposed size will create conditions that are not consistent with a safe habitat for living and breathing and raising a family.

Within the last couple of years, we have built a new home with a view overlooking the bottom ground which will be used for the application of Hog manure from the Sow facility. If we were to attempt to sell the property at this point we would be unable to get a fair return on our investment due to the fact that no person would want to be above fields that will be injected with manure twice a year. We understand that your decision is not based upon personal loss, but we do want it to be recognized as an issue for our family.

After looking through the application from Trenton Farms RE, LLC, State Highway W, Trenton, MO 64683, we have noticed an error. On map, MO602430P 3400 it shows manure application to our property. The land that is incorrectly mapped would give Trenton Farms RE, LLC several more acres that are not in a flood plain. As a result, the percentage of acres within a flood plain increases. 



I am writing in response to the letter of notification to landowners of Grundy County Missouri from Trenton Farms RF, LLC of their proposal to build and operate a sow complex in Grundy County. Also you may note my previous letter of April 10, 2015 on the same subject.

After further study of the proposed building site and land application areas I have a few additional comments for your consideration concerning their request for a permit.

Land Application areas:

As I mentioned in my previous letter virtually all of the soils shown in the notification material are within the flood plain of either Hickory Creek, Gee's Creek or the Thompson River. These soils include 54-Zook, 67-Vesser, 58-Wabash, 51-Falema, 45-Humeston and 56A-Cole. According to the USDA NRCS National Soil Survey interpretation most of these soils are either poorly or very poorly drained and subject to occasional or frequent flooding. My farm includes some of these same soils so I have personal knowledge of the difficulty of management. Planting and harvesting delays are quite common. Finding an appropriate time to land apply waste to these soils will compound the management difficulty and provide many opportunities for waste to be carried into the local streams.

Because most of these soils are very plastic when wet it will be difficult to close the knifing trench behind the application equipment exposing the area to a serious odor problem and in case of a rainfall or flooding event a serious contaminated runoff event.

One additional comment, there are many natural and manmade drainage ditches within the area and much of the runoff drains to and through a natural lake known as "Coppers Lake." All of these should have appropriate buffers adjacent to them.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this proposal and for your time in consideration of my comments.

I am responding to a letter that was sent to my neighbors in reference to a CAFO sow operation to be placed just off Hwy W, Trenton, MO. I am extremely opposed to the placement of this facility.

My husband, Norman Ropp and I live directly above the ground proposed in the plan for manure distribution twice a year. The odor; sight; flies; and the destruction of the blacktop we use for travel are reasons enough to be opposed to the construction of this facility but, I am also concerned about what will be done in the years that the ground is too muddy to get the heavy equipment onto the bottom ground. I site the Maps found within the application; overview map as well as the additional maps included with the application. Upon reading the numbers associated with the application it appears that runoff in the event of flooding would be sufficient to pollute Thompson River as well as Gee Creek with excessive Nitrogen.

Looking at these same maps, Map M0602430P 3400 shows that Mr Don Davis has included our ground in the application of manure. At no time have we ever agreed to this application and have no plans to ever do so in the future. I would like to see this correction made with a follow up of how there will be enough ground that is not in a flood plain to handle the manure application.







We live on Hickory Creek approximately 1 ½ miles South East of the proposed Trenton Farms RE, LLC. Our home is a family farm which has been in the family for 7 generations, 155 years. As a family we go beyond this small community and our home is a gathering place for our out of state family to come vacation in the Spring and in the Fall.

The plan on the application for Trenton Farms RE, LLC shows injection of manure on 3 sides of our farm. North, South, and West will be manure applications and to the East is our own property and the Thompson river.

We knew upon moving here that we were moving to a flood plain that flooded frequently. We did not consider that we would worry that our home would be surrounded by hog manure twice a year. According to the plan submitted by Trenton Farms RE, LLC, manure will be applied up to 1000 feet of our home which meets the criteria.

The exception to this plan would be the degree of flooding and the instance of where the manure will end up. The flooding is shown on FEMA Map 290150 0125A Pg. 125 of 150. I have included photos I have taken over the past 4 years and posted to Facebook of the flooding that has occurred since we have moved here. I have included descriptions of location under each picture. I have also included a description of the NRCS level of flooding. Which would be listed as frequent.

The odds that an application of hog manure will get washed away in a flood are pretty high, resulting in polluting Hickory creek, Gee Creek, and even the Thompson River.

Who monitors or insures that hog manure will not be washed up within 1000 ft of our front door in the event of a flood?




I am writing this letter to you in regards to the hog operation that Don Davis is trying to start up in Grundy County, southwest of Trenton.

According to Fema Community panel number 290130Q125A page 125 of 150 almost all of the stated areas for application are in Zone A flood plains. According to NRCS the Frequency Class would be "Frequent..Flooding is likely to occur often under usual weather conditions: more than a 50 percent chance of flooding in any year (i.e., 50 times in 100 years), but less than a 50 percent chance of flooding in all months of any year."

In the past 5 years flooding has occurred 13 times. Oliver Prewitt, a farmer who has farmed next to the land proposed for the application of manure recorded the following dates of flooding. 4-25-2010, 5-11-2010, 5-13-2010, and 6-2-2010; 5-22-2011, 5-25-2011, 6-10-2011; 2012 was a drought year; 4-18-2013, 5-3-2013(snow melt run off), 5-27-2013, 5-28-2013; 6-4-2014, 9-10-2014. These flood dates include flooding from Hickory Creek and several included flooding from the Thompson River as well. Often, those the Thompson River flood dates were a day or two later as all the storm water accumulated and then caused another flooding. When looking at the number of floods in this area it appears to meet the frequently standards as outlined in the NRCS. As a result, the opportunity for washing applied manure into area water ways increases substantially. Those water ways include Hickory Creek, Gee Creek, Coppers Lake and the Thompson River.








Overview Map Grundy County



We believe that water quality will be negatively affected since Hickory Creek is located 1400 feet from the facility and spillage will drain in that direction. Also, the proposed site for hog waste to be applied lies in a flood plain of the Hickory Creek/Thompson River. This area has been flooded many times in the last ten years. Last year, 2014, the area flooded in late spring and again in the fall. Proof of contracts for the spreading of the hog waste other than a flood plain appears necessary.

The recent Hickory Creek Watershed Project was a program funded in part by the Federal Government to improve and protect this valuable natural resource. An endangered fish, the Topeka Shiner, has been known to live in this stream. Part of the purpose of the Hickory Creek Watershed Project was to help this critter and other flora and fauna have their place among us. Written Comments Regarding Trenton Farms RE, LLC Permit Application
SW1/4 Sec 10 T80N R24 W, Grundy County, Missouri

The following comments were prepared by Kathy J. Martin, PE (OK #18254) for local citizens living in proximity to the proposed sow facility.

1. Owner/Operator – the permit application states that Dr. Luke Minion will be the manager of this facility. He is listed as the manager of several facilities in South Dakota as well. This “manager” cannot ensure that day-to-day operations of the sow facility will be protective of public health and the environment when he is not on location.

2. TMDL for Hickory Creek – the State of Missouri has identified the tributary to Hickory Creek as a place to address impairment by developing a TMDL (total maximum daily load). The tributary is designated for warm water aquatic life. The report states:

“Tributary to Hickory Creek was added to the 2002 303(d) list as part of 26 waters the Department agreed to investigate for possible impairment as part of the 2001 Consent Decree, American Canoe Association, et al v EPA.”¹

The report also states:

“Tributary to Hickory Creek is part of the headwaters of Hickory Creek in southwest Grundy County in north central Missouri. This small tributary flows southeast for 0.6 miles before joining Hickory Creek, which then flows east for seven miles to its confluence with the Thompson River. Hickory Creek is a unique small prairie stream. It is one of only a few streams in Grundy County that has not been channelized and is also habitat for the federally and state-listed endangered Topeka Shiner (*Notropis topeka*), which was collected in the mid-1990’s (NRCS 2005; MDC 2008).”

The concept of incorporating non-point source pollution sources into TMDL programs is addressed in Appendix E of the Memorandum of Understanding associated with the 2001 Consent Decree as follows:

“...quantifiable maximum pollution loads may still be set by larger geographic units (watersheds) and by longer time periods (seasons or years). Also, a “TMDL” program is understood to be a program of special, intensive, and focused strategies for reducing pollution and bringing 303d listed waters back into compliance with water quality standards...”²

The report acknowledges that Missouri still does not have numeric criteria for nutrients in surface water quality standards. During low-flow conditions, the upper reaches of

Hickory Creek showed signs of impairment with a macroinvertebrate stream condition index less than 16. The study showed exceedance for phosphorus and sediment.

How does the proposed permit application address nutrient and sediment loading to the portions of Hickory Creek that flow through the land application sites?

How will MoDNR incorporate special conditions in the CAFO permit to protect the beneficial use of Hickory Creek at the production area and the land application areas?




Figure 1 – Map of the location of Tributary to Hickory Creek and its confluence with Hickory Creek and subsequent entrance into Thompson River.

3. No chemicals on site – The applicant claims there will be no chemicals on site while confining and taking care of over 6000 sows. Is the applicant claiming there will

be no veterinarian medicines, no herbicides for facility maintenance, no rat/fly baits or poisons to control disease vectors, and no disinfectants to clean the livestock barns?

4. Land application in floodway of Thompson River

The MoDNR Guide to Animal Feeding Operations states as follows:

"Areas with flood frequencies greater than once in 10 years should not be the only land available for land application of animal waste."³




Figure 2 – Flood Hazard Map for Section 19 and downgradient along Hickory Creek.⁴

5. Nutrient Management Plan

On page 10 of the 2015/2016 NMP, Field MO602419P4000 is described as having a corn yield goal of 122.01 bushels per acre and a nitrogen need of 100 lbs nitrogen and 75 lbs of P₂O₅ per acre. The applicant proposes to land apply 247,000 gallons of liquid swine manure from the Gilt Development Unit (GDU) barn using an application rate of 4,000 gallons per acre and approximately 38 field trips. The result will be a land application of 154 lbs nitrogen and 168 lbs P₂O₅ per acre. The proposal is an over-application of nitrogen by 154% and P₂O₅ by 224 percent.

On page 15 of the 2015/2016 NMP, Field MO602429P8000B is described as having a soybean yield goal of 43.8 bushels per acre and a nitrogen need of zero lbs nitrogen and 45 lbs of P2O5 per acre. The applicant proposes to land apply 549,900 gallons of liquid swine manure from the Gestation barn using an application rate of 5,800 gallons per acre and approximately 84.5 field trips. The result will be a land application of 96 lbs nitrogen and 145 lbs P2O5 per acre. The proposal is an over-application of nitrogen by 96 lbs (the soil/crop needs no nitrogen) and P2O5 by 322 percent.

Similarly, on page 16 of the 2015/2016 NMP, Field MO602429P8000C will have an over-application of nitrogen (96 lbs/acre more than needed) and P2O5 by 322 percent from the land application of 126,100 gallons using 19.4 field trips.

On page 17 of the 2015/2016 NMP, Field MO602429P8000D will have an over-application of nitrogen (96 lbs/acre more than needed) and P2O5 by 322 percent from the land application of 1,305,200 gallons using 200 field trips in October on 225 acres and then 342,550 gallons using 52.7 field trips on the remaining 59 acres.




Figure 3 – Fields Field MO602429P8000 B, C and D in immediate watershed of Hickory Creek and confluence with Thompson River (pg 38 of the permit application).

The 2010 TMDL report indicated that the number of hogs in Grundy County was 4000 hogs. This permit application would more than double the number of hogs and add a minimum of 4 million gallons of liquid swine manure in the watershed every year. All of the land application areas are in the bottom lands of Thompson River, are rated Zone A according to FEMA floodplain designation, and are located in the immediate watershed of Hickory Creek and with respect to the eastern land application sites, Thompson River.

Corn crop yield of 122 bushels per acre was based on a county average plus 10% not on actual crop yields. The county yield values ranged from 60 to 130 bushels per acre.

No mention is made in the permit application narrative about the adverse impacts of land application of millions of gallons of liquid swine manure wastewater in the immediate watershed of Thompson River. The applicant does not intend to treat any of the liquid swine manure wastewater, so there is no guarantee that pathogens such as *Listeria* and *Salmonella* will not enter waters of the state via runoff and hydrologic connection between the shallow groundwater at the land application sites and both Hickory Creek and Thompson River.

The fields shown in Figures 3 through 5 show the physical scarring of the land where the tributary and river system have been positioned on the land proposed for land application of liquid swine manure. This scarring includes the lasting impression of an oxbow lake, which is indicative of meandering channel flow surface water.

6. Facility Water Source – the permit application does not seem to identify the facility water source as either rural water or water wells. The concern would be protection of the water well by setback – none are obvious on the engineering site plan⁵. The only water well shown is the old homestead well located about 60 feet south of the old driveway approximately at the fence line along the state road.

In the animal mortality compost letter dated March 18, 2015 Todd Van Maanen, PE states the compost facility will be “located at least 300 feet from any on site wells” yet does not identify where those wells will be located.

Interestingly enough, this sow facility designed by Hog Slat and/or Eisenbraun and Associates proposes to use significantly more wash water than that proposed for Callaway Farrowing. In the Callaway Farrowing permit application, the same exact manager “Luke Minion” signed the application implying that information was true, accurate and complete. In this instance, the same manager now says that significantly more washwater will be used for Trenton Farms RE, LLC sow facility and that his signature implies that *that* is now true. What operational decisions changed between the application for permit for Callaway Farrowing and Trenton Farms RE, LLC?

7. Septic system – the engineering drawing on page 9 of the permit application does not indicate where the septic system will be located to handle the domestic wastewater generated by employee toilets, showers, and on-site laundry. The office is proposed to be located on the east side of the facility near the state road. Potential locations for septic leach fields could inadvertently intersect with the old homestead well.

8a. Animal mortality compost design does not follow Missouri law – Based on Minnesota documents rather than Missouri guidelines. State law requires that livestock composters be designed using Missouri Extension guidance documents. Missouri has the following guidance documents and mandates for the proper disposal of livestock mortality:

- **WQ216, Dead Animal Disposal Laws in Missouri:** The disposal of dead animals is regulated as a solid waste by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) Solid Waste Management program and by the Missouri Department of Agriculture's Division of Animal Health. Current law requires that the body of an animal that has died be properly disposed of within 24 hours after knowledge of the death. Disposal methods acceptable to DNR are rendering facility, composting, sanitary landfill, incineration and on-site burial.

8b. Maximum height of compost pile. The applicant chose a maximum height of 8 feet, but Missouri Extension WQ351 guidance for compost sizing recommends compost depth of 6 feet. By allowing an extra 2 feet of compost per bin, the applicant underestimated the number of bins needed to properly compost the expected mortality.

8c. Failure to prepare a catastrophic mortality disposal plan. The applicant did not mention either of the two main epidemics associated with sow facilities, PRRS and PEDv, both of which have very high death loss in affected animals. In order to protect other hog farmers in the region, it is imperative that sow facility operators provide knowledge of the two main causes of large-scale death loss at their type of facilities and prepare in advance a suitable disposal and biosecurity plan to insure that the viruses and other pathogens are properly handled, including mortality disposal and the segregation of all contaminated manure wastes and wastewaters.

9. Engineering drawings not signed and sealed – the engineering drawings provided for the various barns are shown to be under copyright by Hog Slat Inc. and not Eisenbraun & Associates. The drawings provided do not prove that the facility will have the manure storage capacity expressed in the calculations.

In the documents reviewed by this expert, there were no engineering drawings of the cross sections of the various concrete manure storage pits. The permit application is silent with respect to adequate proof that the manure storage pits will be designed and constructed according to the minimum construction standards of the regulations and NRCS Conservation Practice Standards.

10. Operation and Maintenance Plan – The permit application does not contain an **Operation and Maintenance Plan that shows the various manure storage facilities**, manure transfer mechanisms, mortality composting, and transfer and disposal of manure will be operated according to the requirements of the regulation and NRCS Conservation Practice Standards. Considering the fact that the state no longer requires a construction permit for CAFOs, it becomes significantly more important that the **applicant explain how the facility will be operated to protect human health and the environment**, including but not limited to regular inspection of the manure storage facilities for cracks and leaks, spill response plans, contaminated stormwater runoff management and disposal, use of herbicides, rodenticides, and fly controls, and efforts to monitor surface and groundwater for indications of pollution from the operation of the facility that could violate water quality standards.

11. Topeka shiner – The permit application is silent with respect to efforts that will be made by the operator to prevent degradation of Hickory Creek and its tributaries for nutrients, sediments, and pathogens. The applicant has not acknowledged that Hickory Creek is a known habitat for the Topeka shiner, a state and federally listed endangered species. There is no indication in the permit application that the applicant contacted the proper authority at the Missouri Department of Conservation to determine if this proposed facility will jeopardize the success of ongoing efforts to replenish the habitat.

12. Lack of local zoning – Grundy County does not have any zoning ordinances so this facility location is only controlled by state setbacks. The permit application is silent with respect to adverse impacts to the immediate neighbors and the local environment including the potential to threaten public health from air emissions and water pollution. Since the state no longer issues construction permits and this county does not have a building permit process – the onus of proper and adequate design and construction of the facility is carried by no one other than the applicant.

The applicant has failed in this respect due to its choice of where the main driveway will be located on the state road, the failure to disclose the location of the domestic wastewater disposal system, using the wrong state guidance to design the animal mortality compost system, the position of the mortality compost building at a location that is unnecessarily close to homes to the north, unexplained use of significantly more water than other sow facilities in an area that has limited sources of fresh water, and locating the nearly six million gallon manure storage pits below grade and land application of four million gallons of liquid swine manure in a Zone A flood zone.

Dear Mr. Caldwell,

I am writing to you to express my concerns about the large corporate hog operation that is trying to locate in Grundy County, Missouri. The land that is under consideration for the hog farm drains into Hickory Creek which borders the property on the south. Hickory creek drains directly into the Thompson River (less than a mile away). The manure generated from 7,282 hogs will amount to over 2.5 million gallons of waste per year.

$1.05 \text{ gal/hog} \times 7,282 \text{ hogs} = 7,646 \text{ gallons of manure per day}$

To handle the waste the proposed hog farm plans to spread the manure on ground in the Thompson floodplain. This land has flooded 4 times in the past 5 years. Large amounts of nitrogen, phosphorous and other nutrients will be carried downstream in a flood event, which could lead to nitrification and contamination of important waterways.

Another problem with this proposed hog operation is the pit method of storing waste. Gases and odors resulting from anaerobic activity in the pit will result in large volumes of methane, carbon dioxide, ammonia and hydrogen sulfide gas. If the pit is not regularly pumped out and manure is held in the pit for several months, it can release dangerous quantities of noxious gases. Furthermore, entering a manure pit can be potentially lethal to humans due to the fact the carbon dioxide and hydrogen sulfide are heavier than air and tend to collect near the surface. If the ventilation system is compromised due to a power failure or other problem, noxious gases can reach dangerous levels in 8-10 hours.

The most dangerous scenario that can result from confining such a large number of hogs is the threat of disease. Hogs share a host of diseases with humans, including influenza, rotavirus, leptospirosis, salmonellosis and brucellosis to name a few. Additionally there is the issue of antibiotic resistance. "Large-scale animal farms often feed animals antibiotics (U.S. farmers dole out a total of 24.6 million pounds each year) to promote growth and treat diseases caused by overcrowded conditions. These antibiotics are making their way into the environment and the food chain, contributing to the rise of antibiotic-resistant bacteria and making it more difficult to treat human diseases."

We would like to request a public hearing be held concerning the permit application for Trenton Farms RE, LLC. All of the proposed waste application fields are within a 100 year floodplain and 98% of the waste management field acreage is classified in the Natural Resources Conservation Service Soil Survey as "occasionally or frequently flooded". The area floods frequently both from flood water from the Thompson River as well as from Hickory Creek flooding its bank near the Highway W bridge and flowing down Plum Lane and then following both man made and natural drainage ways across several of the proposed waste application fields to Coppers Lake and ultimately back to the Thompson River. We think that there are compelling technical water quality concerns with allowing waste application to several of the proposed waste application fields especially those that have natural drainage ways and ditches that are not protected with setbacks or vegetated buffers especially and no provisions in the waste management plan for alternative waste application sites during wet weather conditions. Artificial drainage, especially when manure is applied with direct injection, increases the potential for offsite nitrate transport. At least one of the proposed fields in the waste management plan, field MO602419P4000 (112 ac.), had hoe drains installed in the past and thus should be managed to reduce the risks for nitrate leaching via the artificial conduits for drainage. All of the waste application fields have surface drains and there may be other that have subsurface drains as well.

It is obvious that the writer of the waste management plan is not familiar with the local fields and soil conditions as they have also included fields in the plans that Trenton Farms does not own, control, or have authorization to utilize.

We are also concerned with the dust from the barns and any attached compounds (ammonia for instance), as that becomes a water quality issue once the dust settles on the ground or other surfaces and then gets washed to Hickory Creek or other surface water bodies.

We all have other concerns that are personal to each of us, but we understand that you are not able to consider anything but the quality of the ground and surface water, so we won't list those at this time, however, we have trouble understanding why other concerns don't fall into play in considering the application.

Dear Greg,

I would like to take this opportunity to voice my opinion about the proposed hog farm operation near Hickory, Missouri in Grundy County. I am a County Commissioner in Livingston County and I own a small farm in Grundy County near the proposed hog farm site. We have a health ordinance in Livingston County that protects property owners while at the same time allowing hog operations to be built in the county if they meet the reasonable guidelines (setbacks, proximity to neighbors, dispersal of waste, etc.) contained in the ordinance. If Grundy County had a health ordinance like we do in Livingston County there would be several locations (many in the Northern part of Grundy County) that would be acceptable for a large hog operation like the one being proposed.

The residents of Grundy County are not necessarily opposed to CAFO's, in fact, there is already a 15,000 head, 8 building operation already established in the Northern part of the county. The proposed hog operation is not being opposed because it is a CAFO, it is being opposed because of its location in the county.

The plan is to spread the hog waste on 800 acres of unlevied farm ground that is in the flood plain along the Thompson River. My constituents in Livingston County are concerned about that and fear that every time the Thompson River basin floods (a fairly frequent occurrence) the unhealthy hog effluent could wash downstream to Livingston County.

Another concern I have personally has to do with my small tract of land not too far from Highway W. It is currently a serene area with several amenities like a small cabin, several ponds and abundant wildlife. It is a unique, quiet place that we enjoy very much. My fear is that my little slice of heaven is in jeopardy because of the proximity of the proposed hog operation. I feel that my personal rights, as well as all the rights of other people impacted by the hog operation have been ignored.

I also have concerns about the road (Highway W) that will be the main trafficway to the hog operation. Currently Highway W is in horrible shape (particularly the crumbling shoulders and arrow lanes) and with additional heavy traffic I am convinced the roadway will decline even more. I am on the North Missouri Transportation Advisory Committee that works closely with MoDot. That committee is concerned about the dangerous condition of Highway W and some of the bridges on that roadway. Furthermore, because of a funding shortage, MoDot has proposed a plan to do minimal maintenance on

the lettered roads – including W – across the state. Without proper maintenance the committee's fear is that the roadway will deteriorate even more rapidly.

I want to make it clear that I am not necessarily for or against CAFO's. I am a firm believer in local control for counties and that comes by having a health ordinance in place.

Every person I have talked to in Livingston and Grundy County about this issue believe it is wrong for Jefferson City legislators to determine what goes on in our counties. That is why we are opposed to SB131 – proposed legislation that would undermine local control if it passes. Particularly concerning from the County Commissioners prospective is that if counties like Livingston that have a health ordinance in place applied for grants thru Mo DNR, Missouri Department of Agriculture, or the Department of Economic Development those counties would have points deducted from their application. That type of blackmail legislation is not only unethical, but is probably illegal... and is simply a strong-arm method to do away with local control.

Thank you for reading my concerns on this issue. I just wanted to go on record that I am opposed to the hog operation being located in Hickory and to the proposed legislation on the local control issue. Please contact me if you need clarification on any of this information.

We are writing to express strong opposition to the proposed hog farm that Trenton Farms RE LLC operated by Don Davis is attempting to establish in Grundy County, MO. The proposed hog farm is very near our home and has multiple adverse affects on our community.

Our primary concern is the health of community residents. We have a 4 year old daughter who suffers from asthma and very nearly died at the age of 10 months. In addition, one of our neighbors who live just 1100 FEET from this proposed hog farm nearly lost their own life last year due to a lung illness. We are concerned about how the hog waste odors and resulting poor air quality will affect health conditions such as these.

The hog facility we believe will immediately affect the water quality of nearby creeks and rivers. Hickory Creek, home to the endangered Topeka Shiner Minnow, is only 1400 feet from the facility and any spillage will drain in its direction. Also, the land application of hog waste is in a flood plain that floods regularly and ultimately drains into the Thompson River.

Additional concerns include the immediate and drastic property devaluation which strongly affects our family's future building plans as well as opportunities for others wanting to join our community. Many of the farms affected by this hog operation are generational with some having been in the owners' family for more than 160 years. These properties also hold extreme sentimental value to their owners in addition to their monetary value.

Also, our rural bridges are in no way capable of handling the amount of traffic necessary for the hog operation activities. Many of these bridges are already in poor condition and at risk of being closed completely if there is further deterioration as there are no funds currently available for repairs.



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


