CALL TO ORDER

Chair Hunter called the meeting of the Missouri Clean Water Commission to order on July 18, 2013 at 9:10 a.m., at the Lewis and Clark State Office Building, 1101 Riverside Drive, Jefferson City, Missouri.

ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

Public Hearing – Fiscal Year 2014 Clean Water State Revolving Fund Intended Use Plan Agenda Item #1

The Missouri Clean Water Commission held a public hearing on the Fiscal Year 2014 Clean Water State Revolving Fund Intended Use Plan (IUP).

Doug Garrett, Financial Assistance Center presented the IUP to the Commission, highlighting the significant changes from previous IUPs. Mr. Garrett noted that historically, the IUP had been prepared, and after public comment, been adopted by the Commission with an effective date of July 1 which allowed the program to run concurrently with the state fiscal year. However, due to the economic uncertainty of the last several years, it had become evident that the financial information necessary to prepare the IUP would not be available in time to prepare the plan as in the past. Mr. Garrett noted that after careful review of federal and state processes, it had been determined that preparing the IUP on a schedule that coincides with the federal fiscal year would be beneficial to the Clean Water State Revolving Fund program and applicants.

Verbal comments were heard at the public hearing by Jay Gebhardt, A Civil Group. Mr. Garrett noted that written comments will be accepted until July 25, 2013 and that the final Fiscal Year 2014 Clean Water State Revolving Fund Intended Use Plan and Priority List will be presented to the Commission at the September 11, 2013 meeting for adoption.

No action was taken by the Commission. A court reporter was present and an official transcript of the public hearing is attached.

Small Borrower Loan Request – Village of Halfway of Polk County

Northeast Public Sewer District of Jefferson County Level II Continuing Authority
Agenda Item #6

Refaat Mefrakis, Engineering Section presented the Northeast Public Sewer District of Jefferson County's request for level II continuing authority. Mr. Mefrakis stated that Jacobs Engineering submitted a preliminary request and conducted a feasibility study for a higher continuing authority designation on behalf of the Northeast Public Sewer District. He noted that the findings of their analysis lead the District to pursue a level II regional authority for their service area in Jefferson County pursuant to 10 CSR 20-6.010 (3)(B) which requires an approval by the

Commission. He noted the District operates several wastewater treatment plants which are located in the 208 St. Louis metropolitan area under the jurisdiction of the East-West Gate Coordinating Council. Mr. Mefrakis stated that the District sought assistance from the Department on how to proceed with the request for level II status and that the Department recommended a number of steps based on experience with a similar request in the past. One of these steps was to submit a preliminary request to the Commission to provide an opportunity for questions and any additional feedback the Commission may have before they proceed with the final request. Mike McCarty of Jacobs Engineering presented a summary of the feasibility study and its findings and discussed the purpose for the level II authority request. No action was taken by the Commission.

Proposed Clean Water Fee Structure **Agenda Item #7**

John Madras, Director of the Water Protection Program presented the fee setting process contained in House Bill 28 (HB 28), which was signed into law July 12, 2013. Mr. Madras noted that Section 644.057 allows the Clean Water Commission to establish clean water fees by rule. Mr. Madras provided the Commission a proposed fee structure and explained the basis for it. He noted the stakeholder process for this fee structure began in November 2011 and included eight meetings, the last one being June 20 and that all of the presentation materials and videos of the meetings themselves are available on the Department's website. The proposed fee structure follows the recommendation from the draft report, and also reflects changes prescribed in HB 28 with respect to construction permit exemptions and a fee cap of \$5000, as well as further discussions with stakeholders related to connection fees for those connected to public systems. Steve Meyer of Association of Missouri Clean Water Agencies, Phil Walsack of Missouri Public Utilities Alliance, Kevin Perry of REGFORM, and David Casaletto representing the Ozark Clean Water Company spoke in favor of the proposed structure. Leslie Holloway of Missouri Farm Bureau also spoke and noted that the Missouri Farm Bureau neither supported nor opposed the fee structure at this time. No action was taken by the Commission.

PRESENTATIONS

Director's Report

John Madras, Director, Water Protection Program reported the following items:

- The electronic discharge monitoring report system is available for use.
- The Department is pursuing several initiatives, including compliance assistance and community assistance. The latter focuses on small communities and will provide assistance in areas for which the communities may not have readily available expertise. It is led by Jim Macy of the Financial Assistance Center.
- The Department is conducting kitchen cabinet meetings for four sectors – agriculture, business and industry, local governments, and environmental. These provide opportunities for each sector to raise issues related to their operations and anticipate coming changes, as well as deal with specific issues. There is an overall cabinet meeting for all of the sectors planned for October 25, 2013.

- The water quality standards and effluent regulations were published in the Missouri Register on June 17, 2013 and will have a hearing September 11, 2013. On a parallel track is the preparation of a use attainability analysis guidance for aquatic life protection, and this guidance will be subject to discussion in August meetings and completion before the rules become final in November.
- Work on shallow water habitat projects on the Missouri River are continuing. The Jameson Island project has a contract awarded, and the project at Benedictine Bottoms in Kansas has completed the public notice phase.
- There are 16 cases being referred to the Attorney General Office for nonpayment of fees that were due in November or December, 2012.
- Jennifer Hoggatt presented the status of the Our Missouri Waters Initiative.

No action was taken by the Commission.

White River Blueways Designation

John Madras, Director of the Water Protection Program presented an update on the White River Blueways Designation. He stated this designation was proposed by the U.S. Department of the Interior to promote and conserve the economic, recreational and natural values of healthy river systems. It did not establish a protective status or regulation, but was intended to recognize and support existing local and regional conservation, recreation, and restoration efforts by coordinating federal, state and local activities. Mr. Madras noted that this designation was made January 9, 2013 and rescinded July 3, 2013. No action was taken by the Commission.

Public Comment

Several individuals addressed the Commission, including:

- David Casaletto, Ozarks Water Watch presented information on Ozarks Water Watch and the work they are doing.
- Bruce Thomson, Mallard Point Resort at the Lake of the Ozarks, described a chlorine issue with his drinking water system. Mr. Madras noted this issue would be handled under the Department's drinking water branch and that he would introduce Mr. Thomson to the branch to address his concerns following the meeting.
- Phil Walsack, Missouri Public Utility Alliance requested information related to GIS coverage for the proposed revised stream classification network and local supervised programs, and suggested the Our Missouri Water initiative focus on communities with specific performance problems.
- Kevin Perry, REGFORM invited the Commissioners to the REGFORM Water Seminar September 5-6, 2013.

No action was taken by the Commission.

Future Meetings

Confirmation was made that the Commission would hold special meetings on August 21, 2013 and November 20, 2013 as needed for the proposed fee structure.

Chair Hunter and Commissioner Leake noted that they would not be in attendance for the regular schedule meeting on September 11, 2013. The Commission requested Malinda Steenbergen, Secretary to the Commission get in contact with the Commissioners that were not in attendance to confirm their attendance at the September meeting to assure there would be a quorum at the September 11 meeting.

2 P R O C E E D I N G S

3 MR. HUNTER: At this point, we would like
4 to call the meeting to order, please. I would like to
5 begin with the introductions this morning. I'm Sam
6 Hunter. I'm the Chairman of the Commission from Sikeston.
7 To my right is Todd Parnell who is the Vice-Chair from
8 Springfield; Dennis Wood, Commissioner from Kimberling
9 City; Sam Leake, Commissioner from Perry; and Wallis
10 Warren, Commissioner from Beaufort. To my left, John
11 Madras, Director of the Staff of the Commission and
12 Director of the Water Protection Program. Don Willoh,
13 Commission's legal counsel from the Attorney General's
14 office. Malinda Steenbergen, Secretary to the Commission
15 and Secretary to the Program.

16 We have with us this morning Ms. Sara
17 Parker Pauley who is the Director of the Department of
18 Natural Resources. There you go.

19 Madam Director, if you would like to say a
20 few words? Anything you would like.

21 MS. PAULEY: I believe I've got a long
22 list, Mr. Chairman, but I've provided my bullets to the
23 Program Director who will be providing those comments
24 during his report. Thank you so much. It's just great to
25 see the Commission this morning and look forward to

1 listening in for a while.

2 MR. HUNTER: Thank you very much for being
3 with us.

4 I would like to ask that everyone that has
5 a cell phone, please put it on mute or airplane mode, or
6 some other thing. Let's don't have them going on if we
7 can help that.

8 At this time, we'll start with No. 1 item
9 on the agenda. That is the Public Hearing for Fiscal Year
10 2014 Clean Water State Revolving Fund Intended Use Plan.
11 The Commission will begin the public hearing on this Plan.
12 The purpose of this hearing is to provide the Department
13 opportunity to present testimony and to provide both the
14 Department and the public the opportunity to comment on
15 the Intended Use Plan for Fiscal Year 2014. This public
16 hearing is not a forum for debate or resolution of issues.

17 The Commission asks that those commenting
18 limit their testimony to five minutes, do not repeat
19 comments that others have already made. The Commission
20 will first hear testimony from the Department. Following
21 the Department's testimony, the Commission will give the
22 public an opportunity to comment. We ask that all
23 individuals present fill out an attendance card so our
24 records are complete. If you wish to present verbal
25 testimony, please indicate that on your attendance card.

1 When you come forward to present testimony, please speak
2 into the microphone and begin by identifying yourself to
3 the Court Reporter.

4 Following the public hearing today, the
5 Commission will review testimony presented and make
6 appropriate modifications to the proposal. The Commission
7 plans to take final action at the September 11th, 2013,
8 meeting.

9 The Court Reporter will now swear in anyone
10 wishing to testify at this public hearing before the Clean
11 Water Commission today. Will those wishing to comment
12 please rise.

13 (Witnesses sworn.)

14 MR. HUNTER: Presenting the information for
15 the Department, for the Commission, will be Doug Garrett
16 from the Financial Assistance Center. Thank you, Doug.

17 MR. GARRETT: My name's Doug Garrett. I'm
18 Deputy Director for the Financial Assistance Center
19 within the Department of Natural Resources.

20 As the Commission has heard in previous
21 meetings, we have changed the effective dates for the
22 Clean Water Statement, well, Fund Intended Use Plan. The
23 2014 Intended Use Plan implements that change -- and with
24 this IUP, we are also the adding the IUP be extended until
25 such time as the subsequent IUP is placed into effect.

1 So, that will kind of avoid any delays in funding projects
2 in the future. This IUP also marks a shift in the way we
3 have funded projects due to the ongoing issues with
4 Federal budgets and to get a better feel for our own State
5 budget. You know, we have gone to the October 1 to
6 September 30 time frame.

7 The project list, as we began to review the
8 applicants, we noted that two larger metropolitan
9 communities were going to take all the funds that we had
10 available. So, we did an analysis of some of our
11 historical information and have developed this Intended
12 Use Plan by distributing the funds across the State where
13 the greatest needs are. The fundable list actually is for
14 components now. We have the entire State of Missouri
15 which includes those service areas of less than 75,000 in
16 population. We are proposing 40 percent of the funds be
17 allocated to that group. Large metropolitan areas and
18 districts, 75,000 and above, 30 percent. Communities that
19 have projects to address CS, those issues, we will provide
20 15 percent of the available funds; and then 15 percent for
21 Green Project Reserve Initiatives and Departmental
22 Initiatives.

23 If you turn to page 24 in your package --
24 and for those in your audience, it will be on IUP page 14
25 -- you will see the distribution of the filings and the

1 amount of funds that we have. Since the draft was
2 prepared, we have received the Federal fiscal year
3 allocation participation for Missouri. So, for Federal
4 fiscal year 2013, we will receive \$37,009,000, which is
5 approximately 1.3 million less than what is shown in the
6 draft IUP. There will be -- 10 percent of those funds
7 will be targeted for Green Project Reserves to the extent
8 that we have applications for those funds, and we also
9 continue to work with the consulting community as well as
10 the applicants to identify components of their projects
11 that could be considered to be green, such as energy
12 efficiency.

13 And we were -- they're allocating
14 practically \$2.6 million of the funds for increased
15 subsidization through grants. We have had discussions
16 with the Environmental Improvement Energy Resources
17 Authority, and we believe that we have initiated enough
18 loans to-date that we can place some of those with
19 payments and have IECRA issue \$39 million in bonds which
20 will go a long way to help us on some need -- some needed
21 projects.

22 Since the time that the IUP went on public
23 notice, we've had several communities that meet
24 Commission's criteria or raise to proceed. Those
25 communities were Ellington, Belton, Holts Summit, Aurora,

1 and East Linn. We will be revising the project list to
2 reflect those communities meeting raise proceed. We also
3 received one application here recently from the City of
4 Jefferson for wastewater system improvements. They will
5 be placed on the planning list.

6 There are a couple of other items that we
7 have had internal discussions on which I would like to
8 draw your attention to specifically. On page 42 in your
9 packet, page 32 in the IUP, you will see two communities
10 listed on a public private partnership list, the Village
11 of Windsor Place and the City of Russellville. We have
12 had discussions with a private entity that is looking to
13 use the wastewater from these communities to grow a crop
14 used for energy. And, I'm not sure, but some of those
15 representatives from the companies -- MFA -- may be here
16 to speak later on.

17 We thought this was an excellent
18 opportunity to, one, eliminate a discharge to a spring,
19 and at the same time provide a resource for energy.
20 So, we will start to keep information apprised of that
21 development as things go along.

22 On the next page, you also see the public
23 entity satellite community partnership where we have a
24 list of \$3 million. What we hope to achieve with that is
25 to allow established publicly-owned wastewater systems in

1 communities to reach out to areas outside their limits to
2 eliminate wastewater systems that are failing or the
3 residents do not have the ability to provide the necessary
4 technical, managerial, financial resources to keep the
5 system operating. And what we hope to do is provide grant
6 funds to a larger municipality in conjunction with a
7 regularly-funded project to go out and pick up those
8 satellite entities.

9 And we're -- what we are looking at is
10 these funds would go -- would still go to a public entity
11 in keeping with Federal requirements. So, if we have a
12 PSC-regulated facility out there, you know, the funds
13 would not go to that private entity, but they will -- they
14 would go to the municipal entity, and that municipality
15 would then work with that PSC-regulated entity to take
16 over the system.

17 So, that's something that's in the initial
18 phases, and we hope that as we begin more outreach to
19 communities to address their wastewater needs that that
20 program will be effective. That concludes my comments and
21 my presentation. And, if the Commission has any questions
22 of me, I will be happy to answer them.

23 MR. HUNTER: No. Thank you, Doug. Phil
24 Walsack is our first commenter.

25 MR. WALSAK: Thank you, Commissioner. I

1 did not raise my hand to speak in the hearing part, so I
2 would like to stand down on that, even though I have a
3 card there for you. I think I can work out the questions
4 I have with Mr. Macy on the side. Thank you very much.

5 MR. HUNTER: That's fine. Thank you, Phil.
6 Do we have any other?

7 (No response.)

8 MR. HUNTER: We would like to have one of
9 the people come forward that marked on their card that
10 they would like to comment at this point.

11 (Whereupon, a witness stepped forward.)

12 MR. HUNTER: Please identify yourself to
13 the Court Reporter.

14 MR. THOMPSON: Good morning. I'm Bruce
15 Thompson. I own Mallard Point Resort in Lake of the
16 Ozarks.

17 MS. STEENBERGEN: He doesn't want to speak
18 on the public hearing part.

19 MR. THOMPSON: That's my next comment. I'm
20 not sure my comments relate to what you're talking about
21 here today.

22 MS. STEENBERGEN: He wants to speak --

23 MR. HUNTER: Okay.

24 MR. THOMPSON: So, do I need to come back
25 at a different time? Can someone indicate when that would

1 be?

2 MR. MADRAS: That's toward the end of the
3 agenda.

4 MR. THOMPSON: End of the agenda. Okay.
5 Thank you very much.

6 MR. MADRAS: Thank you.

7 MR. HUNTER: Anyone else?

8 (No response.)

9 MR. HUNTER: The Commission will accept
10 comments on this proposal until 5 p.m.

11 (Whereupon, a witness stepped forward.)

12 MR. HUNTER: Oops. Okay.

13 MR. GEPHART: Sorry about that. My name is
14 Jay Gephart. I didn't mark on my card to speak; but,
15 since Doug brought up the MFA royal partnership in these
16 two projects that were carved out, I just wanted to get up
17 and say we appreciate, um, Jim and his staff, um, looking
18 at these projects and what we're proposing to do with the
19 bio crop and also using the irrigate systems to irrigate
20 those with the systems that would provide nutrients. And
21 it actually takes something that's a negative when you put
22 it in the stream and it becomes a positive for the plants.

23 So, I think it's a good idea and a great
24 project, and we appreciate this Commission's consideration
25 and funding that has been set aside in the '10 Use Plan.

1 If you have any questions or concerns about the crop or
2 what we're doing, I would be glad to speak with you at a
3 separate time and be able to provide documentation and
4 answer those questions for you. Thank you.

5 MR. HUNTER: Okay. Thank you.
