DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Independence Temple site, located to the west and south of the intersection of Lexington Avenue and River Boulevard, contains approximately one city block of land. Except for a small frame church building, owned by the Church of Christ (Hedrickite), the only distinguishing feature on the site is a small stone obelisk marker. The remaining portions of the temple site are gently rolling grasslands.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

SEE INSTRUCTIONS

The Mormon Temple site and lot, located in Independence are significant for two reasons. First, the site holds special religious meaning for the followers of Joseph Smith. Members of the various sects of the Mormon Church consider the area to be holy ground. Second, the site has major historic significance. Here was to be built the major Mormon temple which would serve as the church's world headquarters.

In July 1831, several days after Joseph Smith's arrival in the Independence area, the Prophet received a revelation designating the temple lot as the heart of the future city of Zion. As stated in the church's Doctrine and Covenants, "Wherefore, this is the land of promise, and the place for the city of Zion. . . . Behold, the place which is now called Independence is the center place; and a spot for the temple is lying westward, upon a lot which is not far from the court-house. . . ." (Doctrine and Covenants 57) (The History of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, 1951 ed., vol. I, pp. 205-07.) On August 3, 1831, Smith dedicated this site. (Klaus J. Hansen, Quest for Empire, 1967, p. 47.) Several months later Edward Partridge, the first bishop of the Mormon Church, purchased 63.43 acres of land around the site chosen and dedicated by Smith. Although the temple site was surveyed and dedicated, construction did not begin. The reason for postponing the building of the temple centered on difficulty with local non-Mormon residents. Smith and other high church officials believed that their persecution by "gentiles" would make it impossible for permanent settlement. After a series of conflicts with non-Mormons, church members in 1833 fled en masse from Jackson County across the Missouri River into Clay County. Then in 1836 after more conflict with non-Mormons, the church moved to Caldwell County where a new Zion was established at Far West. (R. Don Oscarson and Stanley B. MORMON TEMPLE SITE

It was not until 1867 that the Mormon Church, now badly split, became interested in the Independence site. In that year Granville Hedrick, leader of a minor Mormon sect known as the Church of Christ, purchased the temple site and subsequently constructed a small frame church near the spot dedicated by Smith. Then in the 1880's the Reorganized Church of Latter-day Saints and the Hedrikites began a long legal dispute over the rightful ownership of the property. After a series of court battles, which culminated in the case going before the United States Supreme Court, the Hedrikite church received full legal title to the temple site. Today the Church of Christ, LDS, and RLDS churches all own portions of the original 63.43 acre temple lot, although the Church of Christ owns the actual temple site. 
