STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Missouri Valley Trust Company Historic District is a remnant of the early commercial area of St. Joseph, Missouri. It is on the periphery of the area that was set aside in the original plan of the town by the proprietor, Joseph Robidoux IV, on July 26, 1843, to be the center of commercial activity. The early center of commercial activity is the Market Square area which has now been totally demolished leaving only the early "fringe" development which is included within the adjusted National Register boundary.

The commercial area was the seat of business activity generated by the western migration in which St. Joseph had a significant role. St. Joseph was a major transition point for travelers coming from the east by steamboat who outfitted covered wagons at that point for the more hazardous trip across the plains. This traffic assumed great proportions after the discovery of gold in California, and it was estimated that in the year 1850, when the permanent population of St. Joseph was recorded as 3,460, some 50,000 emigrants went through St. Joseph--approximately half the number for the entire country.²

In this business district were already located some of the banks that were in operation in St. Joseph at this time, including the Bank of the State of Missouri at the southeast corner of Felix and Fourth streets, a building now occupied by the Missouri Valley Trust Company. This building has been continuously occupied by banking houses since its erection in 1859-1860. It is believed to be the oldest such building west of the Mississippi.³

The trust company now occupying the building is also the oldest trust company in St. Joseph, being chartered in March, 1889, with John. J. Tootle as president.⁴

The Bank of the State of Missouri in St. Joseph was organized in 1859. Robert W. Donnell, a prosperous wholesale merchant, was the president with A. M. Saxon as cashier. At this time the building located at Felix and Fourth Streets was constructed at the cost of about \$25,000.⁵ The Pfeiffer Stone Company of St. Joseph was commissioned to do the stone work.

In February, 1866, the bank was re-organized, and the firm joined the national banking system under the name of State National Bank. L. M. Lawson was president, A. M. Saxton, cashier, and C. B. France, assistant cashier.

The name of this historic district, a National Register entry, is being changed from "Market Square Historic District" to "Missouri Valley Trust Company Historic District" because the Market Square which was the dominant feature of the former district was totally demolished by the Land Clearance for Redevelopment Authority of St. Joseph, Missouri, in December, 1973.

Of the one-quarter block of historically important structures surviving from the original Market Square Historic District, the Missouri Valley Trust Company is the dominant feature. Therefore the name of this building is appropriately taken to describe the revised district.

MISSOURI VALLEY TRUST COMPANY HISTORIC DISTRICT

The Missouri Valley Trust Company continues to function as a trust company under a permanent charter. In 1949 its checking and savings accounts were placed with the Tootle-Lacy Bank, now the American National Bank. The Musician's Association Local Number 50 has occupied the second floor of the trust company for forty years. Goldsberry's has occupied 410 Felix for twenty-eight years.²

The bank relinquished its national charter in 1871 becoming the State Savings Bank, A. M. Saxton was now president and C. B. France, cashier.

By May, 1881, Saxton had withdrawn from the corporation. C. B. France was elected president, R. L. McDonald was chosen vice-president, and E. Lindsay cashier. The bank had a capital of \$100,000 and surplus of \$75,000. The bank retained its state charter until 1890 when it was again made a national bank.

In 1899, the Missouri Valley Trust Company took over the building. The trust company is still in operation today.

Joseph Pfeiffer

Joseph Pfeiffer was a stone cutter and ornamental carver born in Bingen, in Hohenzollern, Sigmaringen, Germany, in 1817. In his education at the Royal Polytechnicum in Munich he studied the science of architecture and construction passing the government examination with honors and becoming a master builder. In 1849 he came to the United States and worked in New York, Philadelphia, and Chicago.⁶ Later, in 1860 he and his family were traveling to Grand Island, Nebraska, with a stop-over at St. Joseph, when design problems confronted in the construction of the Bank of the State of Missouri building were brought to his attention. He solved the problems and was given the cut-stone contract for the building.⁷ Thus precipitated the family's settlement in St. Joseph for many years afterward and the establishment of a successful stone cutting business, the Pfeiffer Stone Company, in which his son and grandson succeeded him.

Pfeiffer's name is associated with numerous buildings in St. Joseph and the midwest including the 1904 Arkansas State Capitol Building, Little Rock, Arkansas.⁸

The survey of Missouri's sites of historical and architectural significance is based on the selection of sites as they relate to the theme studies outlined in Missouri's State Historic Preservation Plan. Accordingly the Missouri Valley Trust Company Historic District is being nominated to the National Register because of its relatedness to the following themes of Missouri: History, Architecture, Economics and Exploration and Settlement.




