A. Call to Order

Chairman Richard Rocha called the March 26, 2020, meeting of the Missouri Air Conservation Commission to order. The following commissioners were present by phone: Gary Pendergrass, Ron Boyer, Mark Fohey, Richard Rocha, and Kevin Rosenbohm.

B. Welcome and Introductions

Ms. Darcy Bybee gave a brief overview of the agenda and noted that the meeting was being held remotely due to the COVID-19 virus. She briefly discussed management reminders for the virtual meeting to make the remote process work for staff, commissioners, and the public. Ms. Bybee noted Emily Wilbur and Shelly Reimer will be presenting the rules and adoption items, rather than the project technical leads, to help coordinate speakers remotely. Ms. Bybee also briefly discussed the process for the public hearing.

C. January 30, 2020, Minutes

Commissioner Pendergrass moved to approve the January 30, 2020, minutes and Commissioner Fohey seconded. All members approved the January 30, 2020, minutes as written.

D. February 3, 2020, Minutes

Commissioner Fohey moved to approve the February 3, 2020, minutes. Commissioner Boyer seconded the motion. All members approved the February 3, 2020 MACC meeting minutes as written.

E. Reports – The following referenced reports are in the March 26, 2020, Missouri Air Conservation Commission Briefing Document and available online at dnr.mo.gov/env/apcp/macc.htm.

1) COMPLIANCE/ENFORCEMENT REPORT

a) Concern Report

Mr. Richard Swartz said the Compliance/Enforcement Report begins on page 23 of the briefing document with the Concern Report and runs through page 81. The Department received a total of 107 concerns from December 16, 2019, through February 15, 2020. The majority of the concerns received were regarding burning or odor. During this time regional office staff completed 101 investigations. In addition, the Department issued seven Letters of Warning as well as 11 Referral Notices of Violation.

b) Ongoing Negotiations Report

The Ongoing Negotiations Report is on page 83. There are 17 active cases at this time. Two asbestos cases have been added in relation to a building in Moberly. There also are six new inspection maintenance cases in relation to the Gateway Vehicle Inspection Program, which are clean scan cases. Two cases have dropped off the Ongoing Negotiations Report: Solvent Recovery and BSW Farms.

c) Finalized Agreement Report

The Finalized Agreement Report starts on page 85. Five agreements have been finalized. Mr. Swartz spoke briefly on these agreements.

d) Pending Referrals Report

The Pending Referrals Report is on page 87. Mr. Swartz spoke briefly on the three active referrals. He also mentioned regulatory requirement relief information.

Chairman Rocha ask how regional office staff are responding to concerns with COVID-19 virus requirements that are in place, like avoiding crowds and not moving around too much.

Ms. Bybee said the department is evaluating each concern, as always, both in reviewing the concern itself and the ability for staff to safely investigate the concern. Ms. Bybee asked the public to continue to report any concerns.

2) PERMITS REPORT

Mr. Kendall Hale stated the Permit Report begins on page 89 of the briefing document with the Permit Applications Received Report. For the month of February the Permit Section received 42 Construction and four Operating Permit projects. So far, the Permit Section has received 97 permit projects for 2020.

The Permit Applications Completed Report begins on page 99 of the briefing document. For the month of February, the Permit Section completed 29 Construction and six Operating Permit projects. So far, the Permit Section has completed 83 permit projects for 2020. This information is searchable on the Air Pollution Control Program's website and is updated weekly.

The Open Permits Report is on page 109 of the briefing document. This report details the types of projects currently open in the Permit Section. There are currently 155 Construction and 127 Operating permit projects open in the Permit Section.

The Permit Section continues to reduce the backlog of Intermediate and Part 70 operating permits. The Permit Section was down to 46 projects at the end of February.

Since the last commission meeting, one operating permit engineer has left the program. Since most Permit Section staff are working remotely from home, the best way to communicate is by e-mail.

3) AIR QUALITY PLANNING REPORT

a) Rule and State Implementation Plan Agenda

Ms. Emily Wilbur said the Rule and State Implementation Plan (SIP) Agenda begins on page 111 and continues through page 114 of the briefing document.

The public hearing includes eight rules and one boundary recommendation. There will also be one proposed adoption for three rules and one reclassification request. No public hearing is scheduled for April. The proposed boundary recommendation scheduled for today's public hearing will be brought to the April meeting for adoption.

b) Rules in Progress Schedule

The Rules in Progress Schedule starts on page 115 and continues through 118 of the briefing document. Ms. Wilbur provided an update on 10 CSR 10-6.110 *Reporting Emission Data, Emission Fees and Process Information*. The program has initiated the fee rulemaking process. The fee authority for the Air Pollution Control Program is governed by Missouri Air Conservation Law Section 643 of the Revised Statutes of Missouri. So far, there has been one in-person meeting on March 2, 2020. A webinar had tentatively been scheduled for March 30, 2020, and another in-person meeting

had been scheduled for April 6, 2020. Due to the COVID-19 virus, the program is working on combining these two meetings into one webinar on April 6, 2020. The main objective is working toward a stakeholder agreement and bringing to the commission a proposed fee schedule and finishing somewhere between April and July. At that point, the program would start the formal rulemaking process and schedule a public hearing for the rule sometime between August and October. The program will need to file the rule with JCAR by December 1, 2020, for legislative review. The goal is to have the fee structure in place for the emission year 2021 and collect the new fees in 2022, which will help the program meet its fiscal needs.

Chairman Rocha said he was unable to attend the Fee Stakeholder meeting.

Ms. Wilbur replied with a brief summary of the meeting.

Ms. Wilbur updated the commission on the status of Red Tape Reduction rules currently at EPA. EPA has approved rule 10 CSR 10-6.330, and they are proposing approval of seven more rules. EPA is moving forward with several RTR rules and approving them into the SIP.

c) State Plans Report

The State Plans Report begins on page 119 and continues through 121 of the briefing document. The main plan action of note is the boundary recommendation. The program is on track to submit it to EPA by their May 1st deadline.

Ms. Wilbur announced that Ms. Joy Johnson and Mr. Francisco Cortalezzi recently filled two vacancies in the Air Quality Planning Section.

4) DIRECTOR'S REPORT

a) Staffing

Ms. Bybee said that Mr. Hale and Ms. Wilbur already mentioned the staffing situations in their sections. In addition, Mr. Robert Randolph accepted the Small Business Compliance Assistance position in the Air Quality Analysis Section.

Many staff are working remotely, checking e-mail, checking voicemail, and conducting business as much as possible while maintaining social distancing. Ms. Bybee encouraged everyone to call the employee's direct line if they need to reach them or to leave a message at the main number.

b) Fee Stakeholder Process

There was good discussion at the March 2, 2020, meeting. Approximately 50 people participated either by phone or in person. There were lots of good questions and many good ideas that people shared during the meeting and afterwards. Although staff were looking forward to having the next meeting on Monday, logistically it made more sense to cancel the meeting. People are still getting used to this new normal. Staff are looking forward to having the next meeting on April 6, 2020. At the March Fee Stakeholder Meeting, the program shared that the program is expecting approximately

a \$3.9 million average annual shortfall starting in fiscal year 2023, which would start on July 1, 2022. There was a lot of discussion about how the program determined that shortfall, how it expects expenditures to rise, and how fees are expected to maintain or drop down based upon best estimates and projections. As mentioned, the meeting for Monday, March 30, 2020, was canceled. The program plans the next meeting for April 6, 2020. The program is appreciative of everyone's time and attention.

All of the materials from the March 30, 2020 meeting, including a recording of the meeting, are posted to the Air Program Advisory Forum website at <https://dnr.mo.gov/env/apcp/airadvisory/index.html>. The current goal is to file a rule by December 1, 2020. There will be much more discussion and information to share before then. It is possible that, based upon the time frame and any delays, an additional commission meeting may need to be scheduled. If that is necessary, the program will be thoughtful of the commissioners' schedules and the public.

c) Ozone

The 2020 ozone monitoring season began on March 1st and extends to the end of October. The program is still in the process of quality assuring the data from last year. There were exceedances of the 2015 ozone standard last year, however, there were no direct regulatory obligations based on those exceedances. The program is continuing its evaluation to quality assure the data. We do expect the West Alton monitor to be in violation of the 2015 ozone standard, along with completeness issues due to being flooded part of the year.

The program is working on the annual air quality report, which is the report that Mr. Steve Hall presents to the commission. The current goal is to have Mr. Hall present his report this spring, perhaps at the April meeting, but it may be May or later due to delays, such as staff working remotely.

d) Volkswagen

The program opened an application period on March 2, 2020, for all categories other than the Diesel Emission Reduction Act. These categories include school buses, non-government trucks, transit and shuttle buses, locomotives, marine and airport cargo equipment. The application period was set to close on March 31, 2020, but the application period was extended for 60 days and will now close on May 31, 2020. The program wanted to ensure everyone that was interested in applying had the opportunity. An announcement was sent out yesterday to extend that timeframe for application. The program has quite a bit of appropriation authority still to award this fiscal year; a little less than half of \$13.5 million. The program is hoping many great projects apply so the full amount can be awarded. Even while working remotely, staff are still answering phone calls and emails. She encouraged anyone that has questions to reach out.

Ms. Bybee said the commission should expect more to come regarding the electric vehicle infrastructure program. The program was hoping to move forward on that this spring, but there have been delays on that as well.

e) Miscellaneous Items

The commission is scheduled to hold its April meeting at the Kansas City Regional Office. However, considering COVID-19 travel may need to be limited and a conference call may necessary instead. In the event the April commission meeting is held via conference call, it is possible to move a future meeting to the Kansas City Regional Office. The program will look for direction from the commission during the COVID-19 discussion on today's agenda. The program will continue to monitor the COVID-19 situation and keep the commission updated.

Ms. Bybee said this public hearing will be held virtually and, therefore, different than normal. The public may still provide testimony over the phone, and the court reporter will swear in anyone who wishes to speak during the public hearing. She thanked everyone for their patience.

Chairman Rocha said it is great the department is being flexible on deadlines on submittals and giving everyone an extra time.

He also said the discussion about fees are always a difficult conversation. The year 2022 seems like a long ways off, but it is good to start the discussion now and get stakeholders input.

Clean Air Act Designations Process


- When EPA revises a standard, EPA must identify or "designate" areas as meeting or not meeting the standard
- States provide input to EPA through boundary recommendations based on technical evaluations of available data
- EPA provides feedback to states 120 days prior to final designations, "120-day letters"

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Implementation – 2010 SO₂ Standard

- 2010 1-hour Standard set at 75 ppb
- State submitted recommendations for entire state in April 2013
 - EPA completed first round based on existing monitoring data on August 5, 2013
- March 2015 Federal Consent Decree
 - EPA completed second round on June 30, 2016;
 - EPA completed third round on December 31, 2017; and
 - EPA plans to complete fourth round by December 31, 2020.

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EPA's Round 4 Designations Guidance


- Designations based on 2017-2019 monitoring data at newly installed SO₂ monitors (80 FR 51052)
- For violating monitors, states may use modeling to evaluate boundaries as part of a 5-factor technical analysis:
 1. Monitoring/Modeling data
 2. Emissions information
 3. Meteorology
 4. Topography
 5. Jurisdictional boundaries







Geography/Topography



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

 - e.g. Townships, ranges, rivers, highways, or geographical coordinates


