**Summary**

David Lamb and Leanne Tippett Mosby met with local officials and congressional representatives in Perryville about the new ozone standard.

Tom Schulte, in Senator Bond's Cape office, initiated this meeting and Chauncy Buckheit with the SEMO RPC, coordinated the meeting.

Over 30 people were in attendance, including: Ste. Genevieve and Perry county commissioners and other county and local officials, Tom Schulte (Sen. Bond), Josh Haynes (Congresswoman Emerson), Kathleen Waltz (Congressman Carnahan), Ben Dyer (Senator McCaskill), and several industry reps -- Holcim, Mississippi Lime, Chemical Lime and others.

They gave the group an Ozone 101 presentation. What is ozone, how is it formed, the new standard, what are EPA and DNR roles, the federal and state laws, the classification process, the SIP process and timelines.

The "take home" messages were:

- 1.) This will be a multi-year process.
- 2.) We will include stakeholders in every step and the process will be open and transparent.
- 3.) We do not have all of the answers at this point as we are still waiting for EPA guidance on some issues -- e.g., criteria for setting nonattainment boundaries, how classifications will be set (marginal, moderate, severe, etc.), what will the monitoring requirements be.

The meeting was very successful and the interaction was appreciated by the participants.

Some follow-up items discussed at the meeting --

We will need to bring Cape Girardeau and Bollinger counties (at a minimum) into the discussions as well because they are micro-MSA and Perry county is adjacent and has a violating monitor.

Directed them to a Web site for the "new ozone standard" to post relevant information and serve as a convenience to these folks instead of trying to navigate through several different links to find information.

The first milestone is boundary recommendations -- which are due to EPA March 2009.
