A. Call to Order

Chairman Gary Pendergrass called the November 29, 2018, meeting of the Missouri Air Conservation Commission to order. The following commissioners were present: Gary Pendergrass, Ron Boyer, Mark Garnett, and Kevin Rosenbohm.

B. Closed Session

Commissioner Boyer motioned that the commissioners go into Closed Session. Commissioner Garnett seconded the motion. All commissioners moved to go into Closed Session.

Commissioner Boyer moved to return to Open Session. Commissioner Garnett seconded the motion. All commissioners voted to return to Open Session.

C. Minutes from October 25, 2018

Commissioner Garnett moved to approve the October 25, 2018, minutes as written. Commissioner Boyer seconded the motion. All commissioners voted to approve the October 25, 2018, minutes as written.

D. Welcome and Introductions

Ms. Darcy Bybee welcomed the commission. She thanked the commission for being flexible with their schedules and moving their December 6, 2018, meeting to November 29, 2018. She noted this will be the last commission meeting in 2018. She also gave a brief overview of the meeting agenda and noted appreciation for Commissioner Jack Jones' service to the commission prior to his resignation. The program is continuing the review of the Commission's Operating Policy as requested at the October Commission meeting.

E. Reports – The following referenced reports are in the November 29, 2018, Missouri Air Conservation Commission Briefing Document and available online at dnr.mo.gov/env/apcp/macc.htm.

1) COMPLIANCE/ENFORCEMENT REPORT

a) Concern Report

Mr. Richard Swartz said the Compliance/Enforcement Report begins on page 51 with the Concern Report. A total of 105 concerns were received between September 16, 2018, and October 15, 2018. During this time period 91 investigations were completed by regional office staff; one Notice of Violation and six Letters of Warning were issued.

b) Ongoing Negotiations Report

The Ongoing Negotiations Report can be found on page 115. There are three enforcement actions in the negotiation process at this time. This report remains unchanged from the last commission meeting. See Attachment A at the end of these minutes for the slides to this presentation.

c) Finalized Agreement Report

Mr. Swartz stated there were no finalized agreements to report at this time.

d) Pending Referrals Report

The Pending Referrals Report can be found on page 117. There are currently four active referrals, which is unchanged from last month.

2) PERMIT REPORT

Mr. Kendall Hale stated the Permit Report begins on page 119 of the briefing document with the Permit Applications Received Report. For the months of January through October, the Permit Section received 383 Construction and 179 Operating Permit projects. The Permit Section has received a total of 562 permit projects for this year.

The Permit Applications Completed Report begins on page 125 of the briefing document. For the months of January through October, the Permit Section completed 400 Construction and 269 Operating Permit projects. The Permit Section has completed a total of 669 permit projects for this year. This information is searchable on the Air Pollution Control Program's website and is updated weekly.

The Open Permits Report is on page 135 of the briefing document. This report details the types of projects currently open in the Permit Section. There are currently 118 Construction and 168 Operating permit projects open in the Permit Section.

There are currently four Operating Permit projects on public notice. The public comment period for the Title 5 permit for Bridgeton Landfill has been extended to December 31, 2018. Comments can be submitted electronically and in writing. For details on how to submit comments visit the Air Pollution Control Program's website at <https://dnr.mo.gov/env/apcp/permit-public-notices.htm>.

Mr. Hale briefly mentioned that EPA had released guidance on the aggregation of permit projects.

Two more permit engineers have resigned from the Permit Section. That brings the total up to nine vacancies. However, one person from the Air Quality Analysis Section has moved over to the Permit Section which brings the total down to eight vacancies in the Permit Section.

3) AIR QUALITY PLANNING REPORT

a) Rule and State Implementation Plan Agenda

The Rule and State Implementation Plan (SIP) Agenda begins on page 137 and continues through page 141 of the briefing document.

The last set of Red Tape Reduction (RTR) rulemakings will be presented to the commission for adoption today. These are the 17 rulemakings with Regulatory Impact Reports that were presented at public hearing in September. Ms. Wilbur briefly noted a few of the rules and the redesignation request that will be presented for adoption.

The public hearing for the Missouri SIP Revision – Infrastructure Elements for the 2015 Ozone Standard is not on today's agenda. The program was unable to post the document for a 30-day public comment period due to last minute revisions that were made to the document. This SIP revision is currently scheduled to be presented for public hearing at the January 31, 2019, commission meeting.

b) Rules in Progress Schedule

The Rules in Progress Schedule begins on page 143 of the briefing document. The rules that are scheduled to be presented for adoption today begin on page 146. These are the last set of RTR rules to be presented for adoption.

If the commission adopts these rulemakings today, then they will be filed with the Secretary of State and will become effective March 30, 2019. Once these rules become effective, then the program will shift its focus into updating other rules.

Ms. Wilbur briefly mentioned a few of those rules. More information will follow in 2019.

The program will also be looking at the next steps for rule 10 CSR 10-6.130, *Controlling Emissions During Episodes of High Air Pollution Potential*. The commission did not adopt this rule at its last meeting. And since the program did not meet the statutory deadlines to file this rule with the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules, it will go void. The program will pick this rule up again next year.

The program will also continue to work on reclassifying areas in the state ahead of the rulemaking. Once these reclassifications are completed it should make the rulemaking process smoother. These are items to look forward to in 2019.

c) **State Plans Report**

The State Plans Report begins on page 149 of the briefing document. Ms. Wilbur updated the commission on Sulfur Dioxide (SO₂). Those items begin on page 153. At the end of 2017, the program collected data that showed compliance with the 2010 1-Hour SO₂ Standard for the Jackson County nonattainment area. That data was submitted to EPA in May 2018. The program recently received a letter from EPA requesting additional information. The program is working on providing a modeling analysis for the area to help support the Clean Data Determination Request. The program is working to get that information to EPA as soon as possible. On the heels of that, the program is working on a redesignation request and a maintenance plan for the Jackson County area.

Ms. Wilbur provided another update on both nonattainment areas. EPA recently published in the *Federal Register* a proposed approval for baseline emissions for those two areas. That is one of the steps necessary before asking for an attainment designation.

Also on page 153 is round four of the designation recommendations. There are four rounds of designations under the 2010 1-Hour SO₂ Standard. EPA has currently completed the first three rounds. There is still one more round outstanding. This is the round that will address the areas that have installed air monitors to characterize air quality in those areas. There are two areas in Missouri that have chosen to do that: Iron County (which contains the facility Doe Run Buick) and New Madrid County (which includes Associated Electric's facility in New Madrid and a facility formerly known as Noranda). Those are the two areas that remain undesignated at this time. They do have monitors installed that have been collecting data since the beginning of 2017. As we are reaching the end of the second year of monitoring data, there have been some high monitoring values in the New Madrid area. Again, this includes the facility that was formerly owned by Noranda. Noranda was bought out by a company called Magnitude 7 Metals. They ramped up operations earlier this year and the program has been following those monitoring values throughout the year. If this trend continues, based on the preliminary monitoring data seen so far, it is expected that EPA will

designate the area as nonattainment. The rest of the monitors in the state show compliance with the 2010 1-Hour SO₂ Standard; most show less than half of the standard.

d) Federal Register Notices

The comment period for the Affordable Clean Energy Rule closed on October 31, 2018. The department did submit comments by the deadline and those are posted on the program's webpage at <https://dnr.mo.gov/env/apcp/>.

e) Personnel Update

Ms. Wilbur introduced three new employees that were hired for the SIP Unit.

4) DIRECTOR'S REPORT

a) Staffing

The program continues to be very thoughtful in filling vacancies and is reviewing the necessity of filling some of the positions in the program. The program is trying to fill vacancies, including several in the Permits Section.

b) SO₂

As Ms. Wilbur noted, there is a new, potential SO₂ nonattainment area in the state. EPA is scheduled to finalize designations in 2020. In addition to the program paying close attention and evaluating the preliminary data, it is also working with two facilities in the area and reviewing what proactive measures can be taken prior to a formal nonattainment designation.

c) Red Tape Reduction Process

The program is nearing the end of the official 2017-2018 Red Tape Reduction process. The Executive Order does include requirements to apply the Order's rule review factors to all future rulemakings. The program will hold future Air Program Advisory Forum meetings to focus on both what has changed and what has stayed the same. A lot of progress has been made in 2018. She encouraged the commission and the public to ask if they have any questions.

d) Volkswagen

Last month Ms. Bybee mentioned the application period for the first round of school bus replacements under both the Volkswagen Trust and the Diesel Emission Reduction Act ended on September 14, 2018. The department held a lottery and applicants were drawn for the first round of replacements. The first round of buses will be replaced by June 30, 2019, with additional rounds in the future.

The department continues to work toward additional funding opportunities for government trucks, transit/shuttle buses, an electric vehicle infrastructure team, and those school districts that have been identified as needing additional funding to help with bus replacement costs. The program is moving forward with awarding full funding for five buses to financially disadvantaged school districts this fiscal year with additional funding in the future.

Two application periods are open right now: transit/shuttle buses and government trucks. All information, including applications, is available on the Department's Volkswagen Trust webpage. The program will continue to ensure the webpage is kept up to date. The program plans to award \$2.75 million for government trucks and \$1.75 million for transit shuttle buses between now and the end of June 2019.

The first meeting for the electric vehicle infrastructure workgroup will take place at 1:30 p.m. in the Bennett Springs conference room. There is approximately \$6 million in this category under the trust. Ms. Bybee said she will keep the commission updated.

Although there are public and Trustee notification requirements, Ms. Bybee suggested a more formal, regular report to the commission specifically on the progress under the Volkswagen Trust. The program will plan a formal update in early 2019.

e) Missouri Leadership Academy

Ms. Bybee informed the commission that she has been accepted to participate in the Governor's Missouri Leadership Academy. Although this requires a time commitment of two to four days per month (from July 2018-January 2019), the experience has been invaluable and a great honor.
