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GRANT PROPOSAL EVALUATION PROCESS:

The Executive Board selects three members from the board to a grant review committee to evaluate the grant applications. Each member evaluates and ranks each of the grant applications. The committee then meets as a group and evaluate the applications and present the recommendations to the full board. The Executive Board discuss all the applications. After final approval from the Executive Board the grants are sent to DNR for final approval.

No Board Member shall participate ranking an application submitted by their jurisdiction, agency or organization.

PRIOR GRANTEE'S:

The Executive Board will fund a past grantee if it is not in duplication, also if the needs are acceptable.

ON GOING GRANTS:

The District usually does not grant any on-going applications.

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
