I am writing in regards to the Heartland Materials LLC. I live about 1/2 mile, from the location, where Heartland Materials, is wanting to have their quarry. People here in Fruitland are concerned about the air pollution from it. There is farm land all around the Luthren School, and when they are tilling and planting and harvesting, there is lots of debre and dust everywhere. What are they going to do about that?

My husband works at a quarry, and EPA is very strict about dust control, and the safety of the residents and the workers there. If something is not right, they give the company a certain amount of time to fix it, if not they get a big fine. Plus the people who does the blasting, has 25 + years of experience. The blast are not any stronger than the high winds we experience here. Where he works there are neighbors about 2 blocks from the quarry. There have been no problems with them. Nor has it affected their water. But it has given jobs to 100+ people.

I AM FOR THE QUARRY, with the economy like it is, and so many people out of work, we need these quarrys, to give people jobs. I hope you will give them the okay.


To the Land Reclamation Board;

I'm writing out of concern about the (Strack Excavating or Heartland Materials) quarry currently applying for a permit to operate right next to the campus of Saxony Lutheran High School. My grandson is a student at Saxony and that is why this situation affects me directly. I am concerned for several reasons:

- 1) Since quarries are industrial sites, I am concerned about the health of my student and all the other students at the school. As I understand it, quarries generate quite a lot of dust. Our school sits on top of a hill where the wind blows constantly. Many of the activities at the school take place outside. I can only imagine the negative effect the potential dust would have on the enjoyment and health of both our students and visitors.
- 2) I am concerned about my student's safety. Industrial traffic generated by the proposed quarry combined with our inexperienced teenage drivers seems like a worst-case scenario. It seems that this situation should warrant a study relative to the potential for accidents that will exist given these unique circumstances.
- 3) I feel that the livelihood of the school may be jeopardized. Our church and the other 24 association member churches have a multi-million dollar investment in the school, which just last year went through another \$1MM addition. Having a quarry so close to our school grounds certainly does not bode well for a new school which was built long before any quarry was proposed. This quarry may very well deter future students from attending Saxony...making our considerable investment a prisoner to our location.

I respectfully ask that Saxony Lutheran High School be granted a hearing to discuss these and other matters regarding this proposed adjacent to the school grounds. Currently, there are just too many unanswered questions and concerns to go any further without one. Thank you for your consideration.
