



Neighborhood Significance - While not in themselves examples of distinguished architecture, these buildings nevertheless are important elements in the form and image of the district because of their scale, materials, marking and age. Their value is as part of the urban scene rather than having individual merit.

Architectural Merit - These buildings are not individually significant or do not play a significant role in the street scene, but are not considered intrusions or objectionable.

No Architectural Merit/Intrusion - These buildings are incompatible or unharmonious with their surrounding environments and detract from the historic character of the district.







ARCHITECTURAL SURVEY OF THE CENTRAL BUSINESS DISTRICT LOUISIANA, MISSOURI
