

42. Steep-pitched gable roof, slightly belled, of slate, gable end toward the street; wide barge boards, no brackets. Three slate-clad gabled dormers east slope. Three third-story windows in gable multi-paned in upper and lower sash. Three tall second-story windows over three first-story, all of tall, narrow proportions, multi-paned upper, single pane lower sash; brick soldier course heads, stone sills; shutters on first floor windows. Mixed color brick: brown, ochre, pink; in tan mortar; rough faced; stretcher bond. Square side entry porch with shed roof, slate facing in gable; barge boards shaped at ends; brick piers and walls with stone coping; colored scored cement floor. New door of random width oak set diagonally. Foundation of rock-faced stone with beaded mortar joints. Back porch converted to green house adjacent to kitchen; and deck off green house; both early 70's alterations. Interior: Side entry plan with center hall from east side. Oak sliding doors between D.R. and hall. Dado in D.R., marble facing on L.R. fireplace. Original windows flanking fire place presently covered by bookshelves. Back stairs removed, $\frac{1}{2}$ bath added in first floor space, closet on second floor. Second bathroom added on second floor. Leaded glass windows on stair landings.
43. House built by the Boogher family which built several Parkview houses including 6200 Pershing where Hillary Boogher Shewmaker resides today.
A contributing integral part of a significant neighborhood.
44. Lot on Limit Walk, a walkway bisecting the subdivision and running from north to south. Concrete block garage of recent construction.
Situated in a private residential subdivision, Parkview, consisting of six streets laid out in a curvilinear pattern and closed by gates to through traffic, on approximately 70 acres, and containing 254 houses. The houses, 85% of which were constructed between 1906 and 1914, are 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 3 story brick, or stucco, set back uniformly from streets along which on either side are two rows of large shade trees.



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42. Ext: Builder's brick city house. Symmetrical facade with medium gable, ridge paralleling street, central double-window hipped dormer, very wide eaves with shaped wooden brackets paired at either side. Second-story has 4 evenly spaced single windows. First-story has center entry porch with half-timbered gable facing street, windows either side. Porch has exposed, shaped rafters at dripline; original supporting columns or piers replaced with decorative cast iron. Base of porch is brick with limestone railing and steps; extends beyond porch roof to sides. Front door appears altered; cast iron decorative grills (not orig.) in side lights. Windows double-hung, multi-paned above, single below. Small casements in dormer. West side French doors with molded translucent glass in small fan light; balcony with wrought iron railing. Red Spanish tile roof has ball shaped gable tiles and decorative shaped ridge tile. Dormer faced with hung tile; battered sides; edges defined with bell tiles. Tile on porch in need of repair. Pinkish press brick with matching mortar, stretcher bond with narrow mortar joints. Cut limestone sills, string course at 1st floor sill level, and foundation facing on front of house; rock-faced foundation at sides. Brick two-story (1926) addition on west rear, apparently replacing earlier porch. Interior: Living room has cove molding, dining room has beamed ceiling; sliding doors between LR & DR; walls with narrow strips of molding forming squares. Woodwork stripped by present owner. Clear leaded glass window on stair landing and small windows flanking fireplace. Wall possibly removed between two orig. parlors to form one large living room.
43. Owner Webe Naunheim (resident from ca. 1922-1960) was president and chairman of the Board of North Side Bank of Jennings, and taught Finance and Commerce at St. Louis University from 1921-40. A contributing integral part of a significant district.
44. Situated on Limit Walkway, a private walk passing through the subdivision from North to South. Garage of corrugated metal constructed in teens; one of a few remaining of several built in subdivision.

42. Shallow mansard roof with no dormers, of red Spanish tile; bullnosed finials at corners and crests. Wide eaves supported by large shaped brackets. Third floor has stucco finish between brackets and a continuous stone sill beneath the windows ~~separating~~ it from the lower floors and causing it to suggest a frieze beneath the eaves. Brackets, eaves and window frames of dark stained wood. Four 3rd story windows have clear designs in center. Lower floors are of red-brown press brick, stretcher bond in Flemish variation every sixth row with vitrified headers; dark mortar. Four second-story windows of tall narrow proportions, single pane upper and lower sash; heavy stone lintels with bullseye corner blocks and stone sills. One story entrance porch across facade, with hipped tile roof, brick piers with flat stone caps, triangle-arched beams, and brackets; stone railings and balusters; red tile floor and granite steps. Center entry with side and transom lights; door with long glass panel. Two large first-floor windows on either side of door. Base of porch of smooth cut stone. Two story bay window on rear, off dining room and second floor study.
43. One of about 35 houses built in Parkview between 1910-13 by speculative builder George F. Bergfeld and his architect T.C. Lee. Current owner, Nelson I. Wu, is the author of Chinese and Indian Architecture, George Braziller, N.Y., and teaches art history at Washington University, currently the Edward Mallin-krodt Distinguished University Professor of the History of Art and Chinese Culture. He is also a writer of popular fiction in the Chinese language under the pen name of Lu Chiao, e.g. Song Never to End and The Child. A story from The Child includes an incident inspired by watching Parkview children



42. Medium gable slate roof, ridge paralleling the street. Gabled dormer, slate-clad on sides, half-timbering in gable; triple windows. Wide eaves with exposed rafters. Salmon-colored press brick, matching mortar, narrow mortar joints, stretcher bond. Second story has two triple windows, multi-paned in upper sash, single pane lower, and small window in center; limestone sills. One-story entrance porch across facade, with hipped roof of asphalt shingle; wide eaves with shaped brackets; slightly arched wood beams; brick piers and pierced brick railing with stone coping; brick and stone base; stone steps. Door slightly off center. Large first floor windows either side of door, multi-paned upper sash, single pane lower. Foundation faced with cut stone on front. Interior: leaded glass in front door. Ornamental ironwork at bottom of stairs. Marble facing and hearth on second floor fireplace. Original gas light fixtures on third floor-Beams removed in living room.
43. House in Schreiner-Ladd family since at least 1913.
A contributing integral part of a significant neighborhood.
Jacob Schreiner and John Ladd Sr. were in the grain brokerage business. John Ladd, Jr., lives in the house today.
44. Two car brick garage, 1914.







42. High gambrel roof, gable end toward street, slate on roof and in gable. Freely adapted Palladian window in gable with louvres in arch of center window; three parts of the Palladian window are double-hung with stained glass in upper sash; engaged Ionic colonettes on center mullions; pilasters with floral relief form sides of frame. Cornice has block modillions and dentils. Four double-hung windows with single-pane sash on second floor. Front door centered with transom and sidelights, in varnished oak. Large double windows either side. Entry porch embraces front door and double window to left; hipped roof of asphalt shingle; cornice block modillions and dentils; three sets of paired columns on front of porch, Tuscan, with entasis, on stone pedestals; stone balusters and rail. Cut stone water table and front porch base. Granite steps. Brick is buff colored; brick quoins. Interior: Oak woodwork throughout house; beamed ceilings in living room and dining room. Mantel is unusually high - 8' from floor; fireplace faced with brown (Holland) ceramic tile; bookcases either side of fireplace. Four stained glass windows in house. Dining room has nice bay window on south wall. Owner has uncovered and restored wood burning fireplace in east front bed room.

43. Dr. Tom Dooley (Thomas A. Dooley, III, 1927-1961), well-known humanitarian and leader of a volunteer medical team in Laos, lived in this house from about 1937 to 1941 when he was between the ages of about 10 and 15. The first resident of the house was Dooley's grandfather, Thomas A. Dooley, Sr. The senior Dooley, an Irish immigrant, was an engineer who had designed and built the first all steel boxcar and who served as district manager of American Car and Foundry. His son, Thomas A. Dooley, Jr., assistant district manager for American Car, had lived with his family, prior to 1937, a few blocks away at 6940 Pershing. The family when moving to Parkview consisted of Thomas, Jr., his wife Agnes, and four boys, Tom being the second. Young Tom attended Barat Hall, a private Catholic boys' school in the Central West End of St. Louis, St. Louis University High School, and St. Roch's Church. His interests in this period were sailing, horses and music.

In 1941, the Dooley family moved to 72 Fair Oaks in Ladue. Dooley's half-brother Earle, was killed in World War II, profoundly affecting young Dooley. Dooley attended Notre Dame College and St. Louis University Medical School from which he received an M.D. in February, 1953. Upon graduation Dooley enlisted in the Navy Medical Corps and served until 1956, having played a major role in the evacuation of North Viet Nam through Haiphong. His first book, Deliver Us from Evil, (Farrar & Strauss, 1956), describes the evacuation. In August, 1956, Dooley left for Laos with three other doctors to "bring medical care and a better image of Americans." One year later, he returned to the U.S. to found Medico, The International Medical Corporation, a privately funded

43. medical aid organization. That year he embarked on an extensive lecture tour to collect money for the organization, and also wrote his second book, Edge of Tomorrow (Farrar & Strauss, 1958) describing his experiences in Laos. Dooley returned to Laos in September, 1958, working there for one year.

In July, 1959, Dooley discovered that he had cancer, and came to the U.S. for an operation. Again he returned to Laos for one more year and also wrote The Night They Burned the Mountain (Farrar, 1960). On Christmas, 1960, Dooley came home to the United States where he died on January 18, 1961.

Dooley's mother Agnes Dooley established the Thomas A. Dooley Foundation in 1961 in San Francisco and wrote, the following year, Promises to Keep, (Farrar, 1962), a biography of her son. Much of the above information was taken from this book.







42. Medium gable roof, of red Spanish tile, gable end toward the street. A gable roofed dormer is on the east slope, with half-timbering. Broad eaves with sloping soffits, and shaped brackets under the verges. Walls are of red-brown press brick, laid in stretcher bond, with black mortar. There are three windows in the gable on the front, with stone keystones and a common stone sill; center window is taller and wider than flanking windows. In the gable on the back of the house is a single window. The facade has slight projection of the center portion, with its own very narrow tile roof. This projection includes two double windows and a common stone sill course on the second story, and three windows with a bracketed stone label and a sill course on the first story. The second-story double windows have wood mullions. All windows are multi-paned in the upper sash and single-paned in the lower sash. The foundation has a smooth-cut stone facing on the facade and a smooth concrete finish on the sides of the house. A long side entrance porch begins slightly in front of the facade, and runs about half the length of the side wall. The porch has a hipped roof, eaves with exposed, shaped rafter ends, slightly arched beams with pinned mortise and tenon joints and shaped brackets; brick piers, a low brick wall with stone coping, a quarry tile floor and granite steps. The doorway includes sidelights and transom lights and a door with a long glass panel. There are leaded glass windows, in rectangular panes, on the sides of the house in the living room, on the stair landing, and on the side and across the rear of the dining room. All windows in the house have flat heads and stone sills. On the rear is a brick sleeping porch on brick piers, with a screened porch built beneath it and extending out into the yard; the porch is modern in detailing and semi-octagonal in plan. Interior woodwork is oak in the dining room (natural finish), painted oak in upstairs and downstairs front halls, and red gum (painted) in the living room. The fireplace wall includes a bracketed mantel shelf, and built-in bookshelves with leaded glass doors. There are sliding doors between the hall and living and dining rooms, with leaded glass. Most of the original light fixtures remain on the second and third floors, including glass globes from Quezal Studios.

43. The house is one of about thirty-five in Parkview built by George F. Bergfeld, and is typical of his side-entry houses. Biographical information on Bergfeld is in Urban Oasis, (see below). The owner has a photograph of the house soon after construction. The house was in the ownership of members of the same family from its construction until 1960. Charles and Emily Welek, owners of the Welek Fabric Shops, were the first residents. Their daughter, Louise, married Robert E. Moloney, an attorney, and they lived in the house from 1930 until their respective deaths. The second owners, from 1960 to 1972, were Harry Imster, an engineer with McDonnell Douglas, and his wife Margery Dodson Imster, a painter.

No major alterations have been made to the house except for the addition of a screened porch on the rear of the house, replacing an open platform with a railing set under the sleeping porch; porch was constructed in 1976-77, Paul Fairbank, architect.

The house is a contributing integral part of a significant neighborhood.






42. Medium gable roof, of gray-black asphalt shingle (originally slate), ridge paralleling the street. Two half-timbered square-cut oriels begin on the second story and break the eaves line on the facade to form third-story dormers on the front slope. On the rear slope is a gable-roofed dormer with two windows. The eaves have shaped rafter ends and shaped brackets in the verges. Walls are of red-brown press brick laid in stretcher bond with black mortar. The doorway includes sidelights and transom lights and a door with a long glass panel. Windows on the sides of the house have flat heads and stone sills. On the rear of the house is a brick sleeping porch on brick piers. There is stained glass on the stair landing, in windows flanking the fire place and at the opposite end of the living room, and in four windows in the dining room. The fireplace wall is brick (painted) with a recessed area for a painting over the mantel, and has a bracketed mantel shelf and built-in bookshelves (no doors at present. Two large fluted columns, with a band of egg-and-dart moulding on the capital, flank the entrance to the fireplace end of the living room. There are sliding doors between the hall and dining room.
43. The house is one of about thirty-five houses in Parkview built by George F. Bergfeld, and is probably his first side-entrance house in the subdivision. Biographical information on Bergfeld is in Urban Oasis, (see below).
The first resident, from about 1913 until 1918, was Charles M. McDar. From about 1918 to 1939, the owner was Thomas E. Francis, general attorney for the St. Louis Public Service Commission. His widow and his son, T.E. Francis, continued to live in the house until about 1949. Thomas Francis had a law firm with Robert Moloney of 6325 Waterman, according to a neighbor. From 1958 until 1964 the house was the residence of Eric and Louise Reiss, both physicians. Louise Reiss did not practice medicine while she was raising her children, but, with biologist Barry Commoner, in the early 60 's, started the Baby Tooth Survey in St. Louis to measure the effects of radioactive fallout from nuclear bombs. Much of the survey was conducted out of 6326 Waterman. Later residents, from 1975 to 1978, William Lockeritz and Sarah Wernick, did research with Commoner at Washington University.
The house is a contributing integral part of a significant neighborhood
44. A garage matching the house in materials and style opens onto the alley; original slate roof.



42. Ext: Facade has general lines of Victorian Second Empire, though some details are "modern". Front roof appears to be a mansard, with two pedimented dormers with round headed windows. 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

Window seats in living room; beamed ceiling in dining room with original tungsten filament bulbs recessed where beams intersect; chandelier with alabaster bowl in dining room.
43. House built in 1909 by Branch Chappelow, father of the present owner. Designed by the firm of Stephens & Pearson, designers of five earlier Parkview houses. John Stephens designed the Garden Theater in U. City. House is in the Craftsman style which idealized honesty and simplicity and avoided classical forms. 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




42. Medium gable roof, of asphalt shingle, ridge paralleling the street. A dormer on the front slope has a gable roof with brackets and a double window with wood mullion; the windows are horizontal in proportions and have 4 over 3 panes in the upper sash. The eaves of the main roof have simple shaped brackets. The walls are of red press brick laid in stretcher bond with a Flemish variation every sixth row and dark mortar. Decorative brick work includes a raised course below the brackets, a brick rectangle with diagonally laid brick in the center, a raised soldier course across the facade on the second story meeting and arching over the window heads, and a rectangular border of headers in the center of the first story of the facade, with a sill, indicating a window that had been blocked up or a blind window. On the rear is a one-story addition. The foundation is smooth-faced on the facade and rock-faced on the sides.

43. This house is one of five built in Parkview by Moritz Eyssell. The porch which was removed from the front of the house may have looked like those on 6335 and 6338 Waterman, also by Eyssell. A biography of Eyssell is in Stevens' Fourth City (see below).

The first resident, from about 1913 to 1948, was Judge Thomas Bond. From about 1955 until 1972, the owner was William C. Fordyce, Jr., a member of the Fordyce family prominent in banking and the railroad business in St. Louis.

Changes to the house include the removal of the original front porch and the addition, in about 1960, of a family room on the rear of the house. The house is a contributing integral part of a significant neighborhood.

42. Steep-pitched compound gable roof, of green slate, ridges paralleling the street. Two stucco-clad dormers with gable roofs with finials are set in the front slope, and two similar dormers are in the rear slope; casement windows. The verges on the main roof are very close and the eaves have a plaster cove beneath, continuing the plaster walls of the second story. On the second story of the facade are two oriel windows with curved plaster supports; the windows are casements. The plaster (or stucco) of the second story bells out slightly at the bottom, terminated by two courses of red tile. The first story is of red-brown rough-faced brick laid in Flemish bond with narrow, lined mortar joints and white mortar; brick closers are used near the corners. The first-story windows have chamfered brick mullions and surrounds. On the front southwest corner is an arcaded brick porch on a brick terrace, which leads under the slight projection of the house on this side. A small arcaded brick railing surmounts the porch. Projections on the southwest side have gable roofs. Windows on the sides of the house on the second and third stuccoed stories are relatively small and have red tile sills. Windows in the first-story brick walls have chamfered brick surrounds, including two blind windows on the northwest side. The foundation is faced with brick to the ground level. The rain leaders have conductor heads bearing the initials "RS" (Roth & Study). On the rear of the house are a small one-story wood porch and a one-story brick bay window. The interior is in the 1940's modern style (see below).
43. The house is one of about ten in Parkview designed by the architectural firm of Roth and Study (see 6375 Waterman). The builders, Federal Investment Company, who used Roth and Study for at least three houses, listed its officers in the 1918 City Directory as E. A. Davis, Pres.; W. H. Carroll, V. Pres.; Kenneth M. Davis, Sec'y; and Ada Dielman, Treas. Kenneth M. Davis was the first resident of 6359 Waterman, from ca.1915 to 1926, and W. H. Carroll was the first resident of another of their houses, 6334 McPherson, from ca. 1914 to 1939. The second resident, from 1926 to 1930, was Dr. Edward H. Higbee, Jr., a physician identified as "Assistant to Ophthalmic Clinic, Washington University" in a book of caricatures of St. Louisans (see below). Duncan Houser, thought to be the son of Globe-Democrat publisher Douglas Houser, lived in the house shortly before 1941 when he sold it to Mr. and Mrs. Myron Glassberg. The Glassbergs thoroughly remodelled the interior, with architect Isador Shank, in the modern style of the forties; cove lighting and curved walls are used in the living room. The house was sold in 1958 to Dr. and Mrs. G. O. Broun. Photographs of the house are in Urban Oasis, p. 36-7 (see below).

The house is a contributing integral part of a significant neighborhood.



Walls of red brick, irregular in texture, laid in stretcher bond with a header variation every sixth row; dark mortar. 42. Intersecting gable roof, the front roof having its ridge parallel to the street. The roof is of green slate, has slightly belled eaves, undecorated, and a gabled dormer in the center of the front slope; dormer has a double casement window. There is a wide chimney with a corbelled cap. The second story is half-timbered with vertical timbers and quatrefoils. The facade is symmetrical, two bays wide, with paired, leaded casement windows on the second story, and transomed and mullioned casement windows with segmental arched heads on the first story; brick sills. 43. The house was built speculatively along with 235 Westgate, by A.E. Lindan or Landau, with Roth and Study, architects. See 6375 Waterman for information about Roth & Study who built ten houses in Parkview. The first residents were Mr. and Mrs. Sears Lehmann, Mr. Lehmann being a prominent attorney and political figure. Mrs. Lehmann was the daughter of Daniel Malotte Houser, one of the founders of the St. Louis Globe in 1872, which became the St. Louis Globe Democrat in 1875.

The house is a contributing integral part of a significant district, and an example of the early work of prominent architect Guy Study.



42. Low-pitched gable roof, of asphalt shingle, gable end facing the street; shaped brackets under eaves which project well beyond the walls. Twin chimneys run up the center of the facade, penetrating the eaves. The walls of the third story are finished with stucco, and the lower stories are of brown press brick laid in stretcher bond. Just below the third floor, in the center of the chimneys, is a red terra cotta medallion. Windows on the facade are all of the same width but become progressively taller in their proportions from the third down to the first story. The house is still owned by members of the Green family, the current residents being John Green (III) and Elizabeth Green, son and daughter of the original builder. Papers in the possession of the owners include the original contract for the house, dated May 9, 1909, and signed by A.J. Taussig, general contractor, and R.L. Jungling, architect, and early photographs of the family and the house. An illustration of the entrance porch is in Urban Oasis, p.14. An easement for a walkway on the north side of the lot was granted to U. City in 1920. The house is an example of Art and Crafts design and is a contributing integral part of a significant neighborhood.

42. Medium gable roof, of slate, gable end toward the street, shaped barge boards collar beam and heavy brackets. Facade has a Tudor-arched triple window in the gable with stone sill. 42. Gable roof, of slate, ridge paralleling the street, with returns on the gable ends. Three dormers with pedimented gables with returns; arched windows heads with curved, intersecting glazing bars. Boxed cornice with block modillions and dentils. Walls of culled brick, laid in white mortar, in stretcher bond with Flemish variation every sixth row. Five second-story windows and four first-story windows, all with flat arches with radiating brick voussoirs and pronounced stone keystones, stone sills, and working louvred shutters. All windows are multi-paned in upper sash, single pane lower. Center entry framed with columns and pilasters and broken, scrolled pediment with a pineapple finial; capitals are Roman Ionic. 

42. Slate gable roof with shaped glazed green tile ridge. Dormer on rear slope. Open eaves with exposed shaped rafters. Two banks of leaded casement windows on second floor, one on first floor; all have stone sills and narrow non-functioning shutters, of late addition. 

Dr. Lischer was first trained in carpentry and took an interest in the Craftsman movement. He built a small arbor in the back yard, now vanished, and furnished his house with furniture made by Gustave Stickley. Dr. Lischer later trained in dentistry and became one of St. Louis' first orthodontists. House is a contributing integral part of a significant neighborhood.



He continues to live with his wife Erma at 345 Westgate, his home since the early thirties, and was recently honored at Parkview's 75th anniversary celebration. 42. Medium-pitched gable roof, of green asphalt shingle (originally green glazed tile as in photograph), ridge paralleling the street. Front slope has a tile-clad gabled dormer and a large wall dormer breaking the eaves line. Eaves are open with paired brackets. Facade is an asymmetrical arrangement of grouped windows with a variety of decorative treatment, but has a center door with an elaborate stone frame, essentially Tudor in character. Third story windows in wall dormer have a stone frame with crossettes. Second story has a similar triple window placed in the center over the doorway. Mr. Dubinsky and his sons Harold and Melvin have been active in various civic affairs serving on boards of health, religious and welfare organizations. House is nearly identical to 6316 Westminster, next door to the west, also by architect Oliver Popp. A contributing integral part of a significant neighborhood.
44. Tennis court in back yard, now in disrepair. Garage matches house in style and materials, and has its original green tile roof. Extremely deep lot due to configuration of streets. Situated in a private residential subdivision, Parkview, consisting of six streets laid out in a curvilinear pattern and closed by gates to through traffic, on approximately 70 acres, and containing 254 houses. The houses, 85% of which were constructed between 1906 and 1914, are 2½ and 3 story brick or stucco, set back uniformly from streets along which on either side are two rows of large shade trees.





42. Medium gable roof of asphalt shingle. Large center dormer with triple window and half-timbered gable. Broad eaves supported by large paired brackets. Walls of brown brick laid in stretcher bond with dark mortar. First and second-story windows are tall and narrow and arranged in threes, 2/2/2 panes in upper sash, single pane lower; flat arches with radiating brick voussoirs and pronounced keystones; stone sills. 



42. Gable roof of varied colored slate, ridge paralleling the street, the ends of the ridges are swept up slightly at the ends. A slight projection of the facade, containing the entrance and an oriel window, has a gable roof which intersects the main roof; the gable of this projection is half-timbered with diagonally laid brick between the timbers, and the brick work of the first two stories is in a diaper pattern in relief; the corners are of stone laid irregularly. 





42. Gabled roof, ridge paralleling street, of green asphalt shingle, originally probably glazed green tile (see garage). Shed dormer with triple window. Main gables, sides of shed dormer, and porch gable half-timbered. Red rough-faced brick; original mortar black now tuck pointed gray. Double-hung windows are single paned below, with nine panes above. Front 2nd floor windows have black metal sunshades. Terrace with stone-capped brick wall extends across front of house and one bay beyond. Gabled porch roof over entrance. Front door exhibits proportions and finish of Craftsman movement (eg. Green & Green): 3 horizontal rectangular panels over 3 very tall panels matching screen door. Stained glass sidelights of curving poppies. Door set in small recessed outside entry foyer, wood panelled. Small art nouveau windows, 2nd story south wall. Polygonal 2-story brick projection, rear corner, with pointed roof.
43. Present owner, John Francis McDermott, is a nationally and internationally recognized authority on the history of the Mississippi Valley, especially regarding the activities of the French and Spanish settlers of the area. He is a direct descendent of Pierre Laclede, founder of St. Louis. Honors include the position of "commandeur" in the Order of Palmes Academiques, granted by the French government, and honorary membership in the Instituto de Cultura Hispanica Madrid. His historical publications on the history of the Mississippi are extensive. *** (see below) The house has some Arts and Crafts design features, especially the front door composition. A contributing integral part of a significant neighborhood.
44. Corner lot: site includes two full lots, lot to NE unbuilt. Garage brick and half-timber with glazed green tile roof, built 1919. Situated in a private residential subdivision, Parkview, consisting of six streets laid out in a curvilinear pattern and closed by gates to through traffic, on approximately 70 acres, and containing 254 houses. The houses, 85% of which were constructed between 1906 and 1914, are 2½ and 3 story brick, or stucco, set back uniformly from streets along which on either side are two rows of large shade trees.
